X. OLD BUSINESS

A. Receive a Report on the Mad River Community Hospital's Special Considerations.

This report addresses the background on the Mad River Community Hospital's special considerations in the City's General Plan and Land Use Code. It also describes the process needed to amend the special considerations and/or rezone the property for other uses. This report comes at the request of the Council.

RECOMMENDATION:

Staff recommends the Council receive a report on the zoning and land use designations for the Mad River Community Hospital and provide direction as necessary.

A. Provide Direction to the Planning Commission Regarding the Timeline for the Strategic Infill Redevelopment Program.

The sitting members of the Council directed staff at their March 1 meeting to redirect the efforts to develop the Form-Based Code (Code) away from the scheduled public engagement events that were planned in the scope approved in January 2023, (and have been drawing few new residents to the process), and to focus on the preparation of a draft of the Code for public review as soon as possible. The sitting members further directed the Planning Commission to provide a recommendation on the Gateway element of the General Plan along with the non-Gateway General Plan updates and new Code by July of 2023. This is consistent with timelines established in 2022 and shared with the Council in 2022, January 2023, and discussed most recently by the Council during on March 1, 2023. Because only those Councilmember who are eligible to participate in the Gateway element discussion were part of the most recent review of the timeline,

some members of the public, and a Planning Commissioner, have raised procedural concerns about the Council's direction. This item is to review milestones established to meet this timeline and to reconsider or ratify the Council's direction from the March 1, 2023, meeting.

RECOMMENDATION:

Staff recommends:

- 1) The full Council provide direction to staff and the Planning Commission regarding the timeline for producing a public review draft of, and recommendation for, the General Plan update; and
- 2) The Council members that are not otherwise conflicted provide direction to staff and the Planning Commission regarding the timeline for producing a public review draft of, and recommendation for, the Gateway Area Plan Element and its associated Form-Based Code.

April 13–16, 2023

WHEREAS, about 85 million Americans enjoy observing, photographing or feeding wild birds and a 2011 U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service study found that birdwatchers contributed about \$32 billion to the U.S. economy; and

WHEREAS, birding is the 15th most popular outdoor activity, just below bicycling. About 18 million birders take trips exclusively to commune with other birders or count birds by sight or sound; and

WHEREAS, the Godwit Days Spring Migration Bird Festival showcases the area's rich diversity of birds, normally attracting tourists from all over the United States, and makes Humboldt County a birding destination; and

WHEREAS, Godwit Days has attracted over 350 registered participants in past years, with over 50 percent of whom came from out of the area; and

WHEREAS, eco-tourism continues to be an important contributing segment of the North Coast economy. Humboldt Bay, its river estuaries, the region's mountains, coniferous forests, and rugged ocean coast habitats offer a variety of bird species for viewing that surpasses the total bird species counts of 40 states and 10 Canadian provinces.

The Wetlands and Creeks Committee was established in 1992. The Committee serves in an advisory capacity to the City Council, City Manager and City staff in matters related to policies, management and projects affecting creeks, wetland and tideland resources in Arcata. Additionally, the Wetlands and Creeks Committee considers the perspective of open space and agricultural values since the Open Space and Agriculture Committee has been dissolved. Its seven members, appointed by the City Council, serve overlapping three-year terms and represent various areas of expertise, knowledge/interest. The City's Environmental Services Deputy Director, Emily Benvie, and new Environmental Programs Manager, Morguine Sefcik, serve as staff liaisons for the Committee. The Committee meets bi-monthly and held six meetings during 2022.

The Committee reviewed and/or made recommendations on the following items:

A. Committee Goals for FY 2022/23:

- 1. Support staff in implementation of the Municipal Separate Storm Sewer System (MS4) Permit (including stormwater education and outreach).
- 2. Maintain presence on Measure A Ad-Hoc Group and re-visit priority funding list twice per year.
- 3. Continue to review and provide policy recommendations to support habitat, water quality, and climate resiliency (including Local Coastal Program Update, Strategic Infill Redevelopment Program).
- 4. Explore HSU partnership opportunities and support staff in development of paid, unpaid, and/or standardized internship opportunity focused on protection of Arcata's wetlands and creeks resources.
- 5. Support City staff in sea level rise adaptation planning and implementation efforts, including review of Thriving Earth Exchange research.
- 6. Support staff in development of long-term management plan for City-owned Jacoby Creek Gannon Slough Wildlife Area complex.
- 7. Explore options for inter-committee information sharing and idea exchange with the Wetlands and Creeks Committee (i.e. share goals with other committees, invite other Committee members and/or provide updates to other Committees).
- 8. Explore subcommittee formation to support staff as needed and feasible (i.e. grant proposals).

B. Annual Goals for FY 2023/24:

1. Based on several efforts outlined in Section E. Public Outreach, the Committee decided to revise and expand goal six from FY 2022/23 to include additional restoration plans/efforts in the City. The new goal for FY 2023/24 is to provide support for development and updates to local restoration plans, e.g., Jacoby Creek Gannon Slough Wildlife Area complex, Creeks Management Plan, and Jolly Giant Creek Rehabilitation Plan. All other goals from FY 2022/23 will remain the same for FY 2023/24.

C. Wetlands and Creeks - Policies/Ordinances/General Plan Elements

- 1. The Committee received presentations from Community Development Director David Loya on the Gateway Area Plan and provided feedback on wetlands and creek-related policies in the Plan. (3/15/22, 9/20/22)
- 2. The Committee reviewed the Open Space Element and provided feedback on the wetlands and creek-related policies and implementation measures in the Element. (11/15/22)
- 3. The Committee reviewed the Resource Conservation and Management Element and provided initial feedback on the wetlands and creek-related policies and implementation measures in the Element. (11/15/22)
- 4. The Committee received a presentation from Community Development Director David Loya on the status of the City's Local Coastal Program (LCP). (3/15/22)

D. Management of City-owned Wetlands and Creeks

- 1. The Committee received regular updates from staff on progress of creek and wetland restoration and management projects and programs, including:

Mayor Schaefer read a statement acknowledging that Arcata (Goudi'ni) sat on ancestral Wiyot land.

Mayor Schaefer led the Pledge of Allegiance.

CEREMONIAL MATTERS

A. Proclamation Recognizing March 8, 2023, as *International Women's Day*.

Councilmember White read the proclamation and presented it to Carilyn Hammer and Martha Hart from the Women's International League for Peace and Freedom (WILPF), who thanked the Council and spoke about upcoming events in a week-long festival in honor of International Women's Day.

B. Proclamation in Recognition of *Girl Scout Week*, March 12–18, 2023.

Mayor Schaefer read the proclamation and presented it to Sarah Boyd representing Troops 10627 and 90018, who thanked the Council and spoke of the upcoming cookie sales campaign and the activities it supported.

C. Proclamation in Recognition of Sunshine Week, March 12–18, 2023.

Councilmember Matthews read the proclamation and presented it to Jessica Schlachter, Vice President of the League of Women Voters of Humboldt County, who thanked the Council and encouraged others to participate in democracy by voting.

Anton Souza urged the Council to consider making Ross Street a cul-de-sac at Grant Avenue or a one-way street with speed bumps.

Roman Fiero requested the City remove the Earth Flag from its current location above the United States Flag.

Peggy Martinez said the current bus system in Arcata was unwieldy resulting in people using their cars instead of riding the bus. She advocated for improvements to the system.

Fred Weis said he would share his friend's successful model for affordable workforce housing.

Nancy Pelletier thanked the Council for assisting Arcata House Partnership (AHP) to open an extreme weather shelter during the past week. She thanked Darlene Spoor of AHP and her staff for their stellar work.

Joanne McGarry requested the D Street Neighborhood Center be opened as an extreme weather shelter.

Gregory Daggett cautioned against erecting concrete buildings with the advent of sea level rise. He explained that buildings four stories or taller would have to be concrete buildings.

Mayor Schaefer closed Early Oral Communications.

OLD BUSINESS

A. Receive an Update on the Gateway Area Plan Engagement Process.

Councilmembers Stillman and Atkins-Salazar recused themselves from the discussion on this item because they each owned property just outside the boundaries of the Gateway Area. They left the Chamber at 6:52 p.m.

Director of Community Development Loya shared a list of 26 outreach events held before the release of the draft Gateway Area Plan. He said that since release of the document, the City had held more than 130 events including committee meetings, Planning Commission meetings, and community events and workshops. He showed a list of specific concerns for which the Planning Commission wanted follow-up information. He listed the work that had taken place so far in 2023 and work that was upcoming. He shared the General Plan Update review calendar. He also shared a calendar of work for the remainder of 2023 into the Spring of 2024.

**Councilmember White said she felt recording of the SIRP study sessions/outreach events was necessary. She also asked that the Council consider reimbursing community members for recording of the form-based code study session on February 11, 2023. She asked that all recordings be housed on the City's SIRP web page YouTube channel, if possible. She inquired if there would be a summary or analysis from Survey 1 and other surveys? She asked about the status of a planned

study session to be held in the Creamery District. Finally, she asked if there were plans to include the Latinx community in this engagement.

Director Loya responded that the City had contracted with Blank and Oram Equity Partners, LLC to do outreach to under-represented communities.

Councilmember Matthews said she would like to have some of the form-based code completed for people to review and postpone any more meetings until afterward to get input.

Director Loya said it was reasonable if the Council wanted to shift gears on the scope and instead of conducting additional workshops, redirect and have the code developed. He said he felt staff had information to be able to inform the form-based code based on the 130-plus events held to date.

Mayor Schaefer agreed that it would be helpful to have form-based code to review and asked if it was feasible to get a draft code from Ben Noble before June.

Director Loya said he would have to confer with Mr. Noble.

On inquiry by Mayor Schaefer, Director Loya said it was the plan to have at least one final engagement meeting after the draft code was available.

On inquiry by Councilmember Matthews, Director Loya explained that the environmental analysis was intended to get down to a level of detail so that most projects could be ministerially administered. He noted there was no CEQA requirement associated with allowed uses and that when uses were discretionary, and the Planning Commission or City Council had to weigh findings to decide if they could approve a project, then there was a CEQA analysis requirement. He said the way the draft had been released to the community called for ministerial review of projects that were consistent with the form-based code. He said that to the degree the Council did not retain ministerial pathways, the form-based code gave the City some control over projects that may come in where there was a myriad of state laws that exempted those projects from local review.

Mayor Schaefer invited public comment.

Gregory Daggett expressed his lack of confidence that the City would perform the appropriate studies when drafting the Environmental Impact Report (EIR). He was also concerned with items being identified as "not significant" in the EIR.

Peggy Martinez asked that more outreach be directed toward persons with disabilities. She expressed concern that public transit was not being adequately addressed.

James Becker stated the form-based code workshops and surveys had been meaningful. He asked that park-in-lieu fees stay within the Gateway Area and requested that a requirement for privately-owned public spaces be applied to four-story buildings under 30,000 square feet.

Fred Weis distributed a set of drawings of four-story buildings at 10th and K Streets. He spoke about the value of 3-D models. He spoke in favor of Gateway Area walks, round-table meetings, and open houses. He proposed a decision be made about the L Street corridor.

Joanne McGarry spoke in favor using different methods to get more people engaged.

Melody Meyer expressed her concern about the housing shortage in Arcata. She said she felt there would be more public engagement if a draft code was presented for people to review and comment on.

Rebecca Buckley-Stein, Managing Attorney at Legal Services of Northern California, encouraged the Council to direct staff to include housing affordability requirements in the Gateway Area Plan.

Cathy Chandler-Klein recommended that public engagement not go on for too long. She asked that covered bicycle parking be prioritized as a requirement, as well as barriers along bike lanes.

Lisa Pelletier agreed that mandatory inclusionary zoning or affordability requirements should be included in the Plan.

Mayor Schaefer closed the public comment period.

Director Loya responded there was full intent to have inclusionary zoning requirement in the plan. He said staff had completed mandatory consultations with the tribes and was having ongoing discussions with the tribes about how to integrate concepts they had into the Plan. He said staff was happy to do more walks and that the public could contact the Community Development Department and request a presentation be brought to them. He explained that there was a robust emphasis on propping up and supporting alternative transportation modes, including bus service. He said that park in-lieu fees still applied throughout the entire plan area and the city. He confirmed that the environmental studies being conducted included noise, air quality, etc.

Councilmember White suggested staff contact The Lighthouse or Tri-County Independent Living to assist in engaging the disabled community.

Councilmember Matthews said it was important to stick to the timelines and said the Council wanted to hear from the Planning Commission with its decisions by the first meeting in July. She said she would like to see some kind of written draft of the form-based code sooner rather than later. She reiterated that the public could still get in touch with the Council or staff to schedule walks or meetings.

Mayor Schaefer asked for some portion of the form-based code before that draft date to see how ideas translated into the actual code.

The program would provide approximately 20-percent loans to buyers so they could purchase the Community Land Trust homes. He said this would provide a short-term fix and allow more time for a detailed analysis of what a sustainable Community Land Trust would look like.

WHITE MOVED AND STILLMAN SECONDED TO ADOPT RESOLUTION NO. 223-34, A RESOLUTION OF THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF ARCATA ADOPTING EMERGENCY HOMEBUYER ASSISTANCE FOR COMMUNITY LAND TRUST ACQUISITION-ONLY PROGRAM GUIDELINES AND AUTHORIZING A BUDGET APPROPRIATION TO FUND THE PROGRAM IN THE AMOUNT OF \$100,000.

Mayor Schaefer invited public comment.

Fred Weis asked if a property would retain its affordability requirement if it became a rental.

Sherri agreed with the action to continue the program for home ownership.

Mayor Schaefer closed the public comment period.

Fred Weis reported on his friend's work-force housing model in another state suggesting it could be a template for Arcata.

Mayor Schaefer closed the public comment period.

B. Receive a Presentation on CalPERS Pension Update from GovInvest.

Finance Director Miller introduced Ira Somer from GovInvest who gave a detailed presentation on the status of the City's CalPERS Pension holdings. He described the basic concept as being that money going into CalPERS would equal money being paid out by CalPERS. He said funds came from three sources: employee contributions, employer contributions and investments, with the largest portion coming from investments. He explained how lower investment income

resulted in higher contributions required from the City. He said investment income in the last two years had been abysmal resulting in the City's current unfunded accrued liability estimate of \$29.61 million.

Mayor Schaefer invited public comment.

Gregory Daggett wondered how this liability would get paid.

Kent Sawatzky asked how inflation was calculated into this. He said the City needed to be conservative in its budgeting.

Jane Woodward suggested this be the topic of a study session. She recommended the Councilmembers become educated about budgeting and economics.

Mayor Schaefer closed the public comment period.

RECESS: The Council recessed from 7:44 to 7:53 p.m.

Councilmember Atkins-Salazar left the meeting at 7:53 p.m.

C. Consider Adopting Resolution No. 223-44, A Resolution of the City Council of the City of Arcata Accepting the Mid-Year Budget Review and Approving Associated Budget Revisions for the Fiscal Year 2022-23.

Finance Director Miller said there were minor changes being made to the budget for unanticipated expenditures and a new project. She listed the major changes as: \$30,000 for an extreme weather shelter; \$30,000 for a Josiah Lawson mural; \$355,000 to pre-order a new street sweeper; \$195,000 for grant expenditures for Carlson Park; \$185,000 for a deficit in the Information Technology budget; and \$193,000 for increased utility expenses. She said the City's total expenditures were \$79 million with revenues of \$65 million, resulting in a \$13 million shortfall. She contributed the shortfall to grant revenue timing. She said there was \$4.7 million in water system capital expenditures and that was being covered by reserves from the water fund; the rest of the shortfall was the result of new street sweeper budgeting. She reported that the general fund reserves balance was 58 percent of total expenditures, and the City's policy was to maintain a minimum of 25 percent. She gave the status of all the enterprise funds. She said the budget for revenues was \$1.1 million more than anticipated. She reported that there were significant challenges coming forward for which the City needed to plan, including a reduction in sales tax and transient occupancy tax revenues.

Councilmember Matthews asked that the Council receive a report on the allocation given to Arcata Main Street and asked that receipt of budget reports from Arcata Main Street be agendized.

BY GENERAL CONSENSUS, THE COUNCIL CANCELED THE CITY COUNCIL OFFICE REMODEL PROJECT.

Mayor Schaefer invited public comment.

Gregory Daggett pointed out the importance of street sweeping to keep garbage from the streets out of the waterways and keep the City in compliance with its Regional Stormwater Pollution Prevention Plan.

Joanne McGarry suggested that putting a lot of effort, time, energy, people, and money toward the unhoused population would benefit the community. She also suggested reviewing what the City was contributing to Arcata Main Street and the Chamber of Commerce.

Fred Weis thanked Finance Director Miller for a clear, concise, and easy-to-understand presentation.

Mayor Schaefer closed the public comment period.

ON MOTION BY MATTHEWS, SECONDED BY STILLMAN, AND WITH A FOUR-TO-ZERO VOICE VOTE WITH ONE ABSENCE, THE COUNCIL ADOPTED RESOLUTION NO. 223-44, A RESOLUTION OF THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF ARCATA TO AMEND RESOLUTION NO. 223-01 ADOPTING THE ANNUAL BUDGET FOR FISCAL YEAR 2022-23. D. Approve Proposed Amendments to Humboldt Waste Management Authority's (HWMA) Joint Powers Agreement and Direct the Mayor to Execute the Restated and Amended Agreement.

Deputy Director of Environmental Services—Community Services Benvie explained that the amendments to the Joint Powers Agreement were to accommodate SB 1383's mandate for organics diversion. She stated this amendment would establish flow control so that Humboldt Waste Management Authority could move forward with establishing an organics recycling infrastructure.

Mayor Schaefer invited public comment.

Joanne McGarry expressed her support for the regional approach to this complicated issue.

Gregory Daggett said that a lot of recyclables ended up in the landfill and asked how much of the local recycling was really being recycled.

Mayor Schaefer closed the public comment period.

ON MOTION BY MATTHEWS, SECONDED BY STILLMAN, AND WITH A FOUR-TO-ZERO VOICE VOTE WITH ONE ABSENCE, THE COUNCIL DIRECTED THE MAYOR TO EXECUTE THE RESTATED AND AMENDED JOINT POWERS AGREEMENT WITH HUMBOLDT WASTE MANAGEMENT AUTHORITY. AYES:

Mayor Schaefer invited public comment.

Fred Weis asked if the Council was interested in making a decision on the L Street couplet. He urged the Council to watch the Planning Commission meetings.

Gregory Daggett asked who would be the presenters at the upcoming March 28, 2023, study session on sea level rise.

Joanne McGarry advocated for decentralized wastewater treatment and expressed her concern about unhoused people.

Ken Sawatzky encouraged the City to move its wastewater treatment plant. He predicted a recession or depression.

Mayor Schaefer closed Oral and Written Communications.

COUNCIL AND STAFF REPORTS

City Manager Diemer announced that the two new electric buses would be in service the following week.

Mayor Schaefer announced that the Council members would be attending a CivicWell Policymakers Conference March 16-19, 2023.

Councilmember White announced Playhouse Arts' Ninth Street location that provided an opportunity for the unhoused to do art and get out of the weather. She said the extreme weather shelter would be closing for maintenance. She reported she and Mayor Schaefer had been working with local organizations to try to find resources for the unhoused. She put in a request to allocate \$175 for recording the upcoming study session on sea level rise.

Mayor Schaefer reported further on the current work of faith-based and other local organizations to find resources for the unhoused.

Park Improvement Project Phase 1 to Mobley Construction DBA MCI in the Amount of \$349,003.00 (Base Bid + Additive Alternative No. 1); Authorize the City Engineer to Increase the Contract Amount by up to \$69,800.60, (20 Percent, for a Total Amount Not to Exceed \$418,803.60) to Allow for Any Unforeseen Contingencies; and Authorize the City Manager to Execute All Applicable

Documents.

RECOMMENDATION:

It is recommended that the Council:

- 1) Approve the project plans and award a construction contract for the Redwood Park Improvement Project Phase 1 to Mobley Construction DBA MCI in the amount of \$349,003.00 (Base Bid + Additive Alternative No. 1);
- 2) Authorize the City Engineer to increase the contract amount by up to \$69,800.60, (20 percent, for a total amount not to exceed \$418,803.60) to allow for any unforeseen contingencies; and
- 3) Authorize the City Manager to execute all applicable documents.

INTRODUCTION:

This project is listed on the City's Capital Improvements Program (CIP) list. This phase (Phase 1) of the project includes improvements to the existing playground area and a new bicycle pump track. Future phases of work at Redwood Park may include improvements to the basketball court, outdoor performance space, and parking areas (for both the Redwood Park Road and Park Drive entrances). This project was advertised on March 1, 2023 and bids were opened on March 23, 2023.

BACKGROUND:

This project includes various improvements within Redwood Park informed by the Redwood Park Master Plan effort in 2019-2020. The improvements for this phase are primarily located at the southern side of the park near the existing playground area. Although the playground area will be completely renovated as part of this phase, the equipment and surfacing material are not included as part of this contract and will be secured through a separate cooperative purchasing agreement. If

awarded, this current contract would include the site preparation needed in order to install the surfacing material and playground equipment. In addition, this contract includes new sidewalks, improved drainage, a new accessible parking stall and a new bicycle pump track (Additive Alternate No.1).

DISCUSSION:

Sealed bids were received until 11:00 a.m. on March 23, 2023. Five (5) sealed bids were received by the deadline:

ENVIRONMENTAL REVIEW (CEQA):

The California Environmental Quality Act (CEQA) determination for the Redwood Park Improvements portion of the project is a categorical exemption pursuant to CEQA Guidelines Section 15303,15304 and 15332. A Notice of Exemption was recorded in January 2021.

BUDGET/FISCAL IMPACT:

The Redwood Park Improvement Project is supported through a grant from the Infill & Infrastructure Grant (IIG) program and the a State Parks Per Capita Grant. ARPA funds were also allocated by the City Council for this project and will be utilized for a subsequent playground equipment purchase.

The contract bid amount is within the budget allocation for the 2022/2023 Fiscal Year. This project is budgeted as follows:









TYPICAL FEATURE PLAN VIEW



RECOMMENDATION:

It is recommended that the Council:

- 1) Approve the purchase of one Elgin RegenX Street Sweeper, in the amount of \$353,731.10, including tax, and award contract to Owen Equipment through a Sourcewell Cooperative Purchasing Agreement.
- 2) Authorize the City Manager to execute all applicable documents.

INTRODUCTION:

The City Council approved the addition of a new street sweeper to the 2022/23 budget at the mid-year budget adoption on March 15. The Environmental Services Department is requesting this vehicle purchase at mid-year due to being informed by dealerships and cooperative purchasing entities that fleet vehicles are in high demand and that lead times for vehicle delivery are much longer than in previous years—often a one-year wait. Staff researched appropriate vehicles, including full electric options per a Council priority to shift towards an emission-free fleet. Staff recommends the Council consider for this urgent need, the purchase of one Lightweight Diesel Elgin RegenX Street Sweeper for the City to retire the very-aged current sweeper vehicle, satisfy upcoming air quality regulations and ensure reliable street sweeping service can continue for the City.

BACKGROUND/DISCUSSION:

Street sweeping enables the City to meet community and beautification priorities as well as regulatory requirements to reduce stormwater contamination reaching our creeks, sensitive habitats, and Humboldt Bay. The City's current street sweeper is well-aged past its planned replacement timeframe and requires significant maintenance to stay in operation. Additionally, the sweeper vehicle will soon not be able to meet air quality requirements. The current street sweeper is a heavy-duty vehicle requiring a commercial driver's license.

City street sweeping services are carried out by a part-time City staff position requiring a commercial driver's license. The department has consistently found it difficult to attract and retain a part-time candidate that can be hired with a commercial license to start operations with minimal training. Hiring a candidate without a commercial license takes additional time from licensed full-time staff to supervise the new staff person operating the sweeper to log enough supervised qualifying hours behind the wheel.

The City used Sourcewell cooperative purchasing contract no. 093021-ELG and secured a quote from Owen Equipment (including taxes and delivery) of \$353,731.10 for the Lightweight Diesel Elgin RegenX Street Sweeper (included as Attachment A). The vendor anticipates the sweeper being available 240-365 days from the date of purchase. The lightweight vehicle would be able to be operated by an operator without a commercial license, expanding the potential pool of candidates to maintain more consistent street sweeping services throughout Arcata. The City also sought quotes for an electric street sweeper to explore if the department could start to shift our heavy-duty fleet towards electric. The quoted prices for an electric sweeper were over twice the amount of the lightweight diesel and due to its weight would require a commercial license to operate. Additionally, electric vehicle delivery can often be close to two years out or longer.

The Environmental Services Department recommends the purchase of the lightweight diesel sweeper. Staff will continue to look for opportunities to further advance our fleet towards a green fleet. Current supply chains and long lead times for electric vehicles (which we are also finding for hybrid vehicles) can compromise the City's ability to maintain current levels of service on our streets and within our departments.

BUDGET/FISCAL IMPACT:

The total cost for the Elgin RegenX Street Sweeper is \$353,731.70. Budget for this purchase is available through the Central Garage Vehicle Capital account 771-50-57-57900 New/Used Vehicles, with operating transfers of \$120,000 from the General Fund (101), \$35,000 from the Wastewater Fund (662), \$75,000 from the Solid Waste Fund (664) and \$35,000 from the Stormwater Fund (666).

- 1) Adopt Resolution No. 223-45, A Resolution of the City Council of the City of Arcata Authorizing Approval to Apply for the California Energy Commission 1% Interest Loan; and
- 2) Find the project is exempt from CEQA pursuant to California Code of Regulations, Title 14, Section 15301.

INTRODUCTION:

The City Council and City Environmental Services Department have identified several goals and priority projects to mitigate and adapt to the impact of climate change. To further these goals, this resolution would authorize the City to apply to the California Energy Commission for a 1% interest loan up to \$576,356.00 to install a roof-mounted solar photovoltaic array and retrofit 137 lighting fixtures at the Arcata Community Center.

BACKGROUND/DISCUSSION:

On December 21, 2022, the City Council adopted Resolution No. 223-25 authorizing approval to apply for a \$480,297.00 1% Interest Loan from the California Energy Commission (CEC) to install a roof-mounted solar photovoltaic array and retrofit 137 lighting fixtures at the Arcata Community Center. Since then, the CEC has updated their guidance on loan applications, enabling the City to apply for additional funds if needed.

While the project scope remains the same as what was proposed in December 2022, authorizing additional loan funding will provide the City with contingency funding for any cost escalations or unforeseen circumstances that may arise.

The City Council and Environmental Services Department have identified several goals and priority projects to mitigate and adapt to the impact of climate change. Some of these include:

- City Council allocated \$500,000 American Rescue Plan Act (ARPA) funds to Climate Change Adaptation Measures, including facility upgrades to reduce energy use and greenhouse gas emissions from use of City facilities.
- City Council Policy Objectives include promoting efficient use of energy and use of renewable energy in buildings, facilities, and infrastructure in Arcata.
- City Council Priority Projects for 2022/2023 fiscal year include finalizing and monitoring ARPA funds set aside for climate change and local emission reduction measures.
- The City of Arcata's Department Goals for Energy and Climate include continuing to decarbonize City facilities, including fuel-switching, energy efficiency upgrades, solar installation, and battery back-up projects; as well as advancing energy upgrades to the Arcata Community Center.

City staff began working with Redwood Coast Energy Authority's (RCEA) Public Agency Solar Program to identify opportunities to advance decarbonization goals for City facilities in January 2020. As part of this work, RCEA performed an analysis of the energy consumption, efficiency opportunities, and solar photovoltaic (PV) installation opportunities at the Arcata Community Center. The results of the attached Solar Feasibility Analysis concluded that the most technically and economically viable projects include interior and exterior lighting efficiency upgrades and a roof mounted solar PV installation. Combined with efficiency measures, a solar PV array could offset approximately 100% of the current electric consumption of the meters located at the Community Center, including the Sports Complex, Maintenance Shop, and parking lot lights.

To fund these improvement projects, the City could apply for the California Energy Commission (CEC) 1% interest loan available to qualified renewable energy projects through the Energy Conservation and Assistance Act (ECAA). Environmental Services staff reviewed the parameters of the loan with the City's Finance Director in October 2022. Should the City choose, it could pay down the loan prior to its amortization period using a portion of the ARPA funds allocated to climate change adaptation measures. Alternatively, the City could continue to set aside ARPA climate change adaptation funds for additional fuel switching and efficiency projects at City facilities.

ENVIRONMENTAL REVIEW (CEQA):

If approved, the activities funded by the loan are statutorily exempt based on Public Resources Code section 21080.35 and categorically exempt based on CEQA guidelines sections 15301 as minor alterations to existing facilities that involve no expansion of an existing or former use at the site and 15303 as the installation of small new equipment on small structures.

BUDGET/FISCAL IMPACT:

The CEC's ECAA loan is a 1% loan for a total of \$576,356.00. The loan amortization is based the estimated savings from the energy projects that it funds. The payback period begins one year after project completion. Because the loan is paid for by the annual energy savings to the City, the loan is cost neutral and functions similar to an "on-bill" finance program. Based on the Solar Feasibility Assessment, the simple payback period is 13.6 years. Should the City choose, it could pay down the loan prior to its amortization period.

Additionally, under the provisions of the Inflation Reduction Act, tax-exempt entities will be eligible for a direct payment in lieu of a tax credit worth 30% of the total solar array costs. While this is not a component of the loan application, it will help to off-set cost impacts associated with construction of the solar array.

1 Executive Summary

The City of Arcata (COA) is working with Redwood Coast Energy Authority's (RCEA) Public Agency Solar Program. As part of that work, RCEA performed an analysis of the energy consumption, efficiency opportunities, and solar photovoltaic installation opportunities at the Arcata Community Center, located at 321 Community Park Way in Arcata. RCEA believes that the most technically and economically viable projects include interior and exterior lighting efficiency upgrades and a solar PV installation at the Arcata Community Center.

RCEA believes that the City of Arcata could apply for the CEC 1% interest loans available to qualified renewable energy projects through the Energy Conservation and Assistance Act (ECAA). RCEA believes these projects will qualify for the ECAA 1% interest loans. If the City of Arcata's City Council resolves to move forward with any of the projects described in this report, RCEA's Public Agency Solar Program will continue to provide support in the form of project management, loan application assistance and technical assistance. Table 1 below provides a summary of the results from RCEA's efficiency and solar PV feasibility analyses.

2 Introduction

The City of Arcata began working with Redwood Coast Energy Authority as part of RCEA's Public Agency Solar Program in January of 2020. After an initial kick-off meeting with City staff, the city indicated three initial sites of interest: Arcata Library, Arcata Community Center, and the 4700 West End Road site. Due to limitations via Covid-19 safety recommendations, RCEA conducted virtual assessments of the City's sites of interest. This report is limited to RCEA's analysis of the energy consumption, efficiency options, and solar photovoltaic installation opportunities at the Arcata Community Center.

2.1 Site Description

The Arcata Community Center is an assembly facility located at 321 Community Park Way in Arcata, CA. The site is used for community events and city sponsored programs. The community center hosts a senior dining program, a teen center, and has a commercial kitchen, dining room, gymnastics court, gymnasium, and classrooms. The site also has two community soccer fields, a futsal court and two softball/baseball fields with sports lighting. The site was first assessed back in 2013 by the Redwood Coast Energy Authority's (RCEA) Energy Watch program for lighting opportunities and again in 2021 by RCEA's Local Government Partnership program

for additional energy saving measures. As part of the Energy Watch program, the community center upgraded the parking lot lighting from high intensity discharge lighting to all LED fixtures. There is also a city maintenance facility located on the same property.

2.2 Facility Description

The Arcata Community Center is a single building with 19,639 square feet of conditioned space. The building was constructed in 1999. The interior space comprises a lobby, a gymnasium, a teen center, a senior center/senior dining room, senior center office, an arts and crafts room, a conference room, a commercial kitchen, restrooms, as well as hallways and storage areas. These areas are detailed in Table 2 below.

3 Electric Load Analysis




Figure 1 Annual electric use from the Arcata Community Center's five electric meters analyzed in this report.




Figure 2 Annual electric cost from the Arcata Community Center's five electric meters analyzed in this report.

RCEA performed an electric load analysis of the City of Arcata's electric consumption using utility data from the previous 12 months of use covering the period from January of 2022 to December of 2022. COA receives electric transmission and distribution service from PG&E and is enrolled in RCEA's Community Choice Energy program, a Community Choice Aggregation program that provides the power content. Analysis of the Arcata Community Center site includes five (5) electric meters: both north and south ballfield lights, the maintenance building, the parking lot lights, and the main community center building. The electric meters are on B1 (3), B6, and B10 electric rate schedules respectively. RCEA's and PG&E's electric rates and time-of-use periods used throughout this analysis can be found in **Appendix A** of this document. Table 3 and Figures 1 and 2 below show a summary of the annual electric costs and consumption across the five (5) electric meters analyzed in this report.

4 Arcata Community Center

The total annual electric load for the community center site, which includes all five (5) onsite electric meters, was 114,357 kilowatt hours (kWh) per year. The total annual cost of electricity at the community center site during the 12 months analyzed in this report was \$38,947. The largest electric account is on a B10 electric rate, with smaller accounts on B1 and B6 electric rates. The site includes five (5) electric meters: both north and south field lights, the maintenance building, the parking lot lights, and the main community center building. The electric meters are on B1 (3), B6, and B10 electric rate schedules respectively. Table 4 below shows a summary of the electric use and costs for the five meters.

4.1 Community Center Efficiency Opportunities

RCEA performed an in-person audit and assessment of the interior and exterior lighting fixtures in September of 2021. The existing can fixtures in the gymnasium and gymnastics room use compact fluorescent (CFL) lamps. Can lights can be either completely replaced or retrofitted using a retrofit kit. The recommended fixtures retrofits are also available with an option to add a dimming control. The dimming features may be used to reduce energy usage of the lights for demand response. RCEA's audit found a total of 42 CFL can fixtures.

The existing fixtures in the Gymnasium are square recessed high bay fixtures with a metal halide bulb. Maintenance savings from the long life of the LEDs are especially important for difficult to access fixtures, such as these. Due to the unusual style of these fixtures and to retain the recessed look, a retrofit kits for the high bay inside is recommended. The recommended retrofit is also available with a dimming option for demand response. RCEA's audit found a total of 31 high bay fixtures.

The wallpacks on the exterior of the building are metal halide full cutoff fixtures. LED fixtures have instant-on capabilities with no warm-up time needed. This allows the lights to be fitted with motion sensors if desired. Exterior lighting can also be dimmed for demand response. The full cutoff fixtures do not add to light pollution in the sky. The latest recommendations for exterior lighting include changing to a warmer color temperature, at least 4000K or even lower. RCEA's audit found 5 of these fixtures.

The exterior doorways are also lit with LED Can lights. Replacing the can lights with an LED fixture will reduce the energy usage. Instead of a can fixture, a canopy fixture can be installed in the existing space of the can. The color temperature of the canopy fixture should be chosen to match the wallpacks. RCEA's audit found 7 of these fixtures.

Currently most of the switching in the Community Center appears to be manual. Adding occupancy sensors to areas with intermittent occupancy, such as bathrooms and closets will ensure that lights get turned off without ever having to touch a switch. For rooms where lights might need to remain off at times, or where more control is needed, a vacancy switch can be installed. Vacancy switches are manually turned on but turn off automatically when there is no occupancy. In areas where new fixtures could be installed, such as the gymnasium, gymnastics court, and exterior, dimming capability could also be installed. Fixtures with dimming drivers much be selected, and additional control wiring may be necessary. If the gymnasium has natural light, dimming could happen automatically to adjust to the available daylight. Dimming controls can also be used for demand response. A small reduction in light levels could lead to significant energy savings during a grid event.

The Arcata Community Center also supports two community baseball/softball fields that are currently lit with high wattage (1500-wat) metal halide fixtures. These fixtures could be replaced with lower wattage LED sports lighting that would save energy usage and costs. In addition, these fixtures would provide labor and maintenance savings because they have a much longer life than traditional metal halide bulbs which need more regular replacement. RCEA's audit found 52 of these fixtures.

RCEA estimates that the site could offset about 22% of its annual electric usage and costs by implementing LED lighting upgrades. The project would have a simple payback of 19.6 years, LED technologies have an effective useful life (EUL) of 15 years. Table 5 below shows a summary of the available savings from an LED lighting upgrade at the Arcata Community Center.

4.2 Solar Photovoltaic (PV) Site Analysis




Figure 3 Potential solar PV installation area at COA's Community Center Building.

The Arcata Community Center site has available area for solar PV arrays on the southwest and southeast facing roofs of the community center building. The Community Center building is a multistory building; the roof has a 3-in-12 pitch (14.0°). The southwest facing roof is oriented 35 degrees west of due south (215°) and will experience approximately 2% shading on average. The southeast facing roof is oriented 45 degrees east of due south (125°) and will experience approximately 2% shading on average. The northwest facing roof is oriented 125 degrees west of due south (305°) and will experience approximately 2% shading on average. California Fire Marshal guidance for solar PV installations require 3' setbacks from gable ends and ridges of the roof. Accounting for area constraints due to small obstructions on the roof surface and Fire Marshall setbacks, the available area for installation on the roofs of the community center is approximately 6,500 square feet. Figure 3 below shows the potential layout and installation area for rooftop solar PV at the Arcata Community Center site.

4.3 Solar Photovoltaic (PV) System Size

RCEA estimates that the Community Center southeast, southwest, and northwest facing roofs shown in Figure 3 could host a combined 109 kW DC solar photovoltaic array.

A 109 kW DC solar PV array installed on the Community Center roof could offset approximately 100% of the electric consumption and 63% of the electric bills associated with the five electric accounts at the Community Center.

4.4 NEM2A Option




Figure 4 Community Center parcel and five associated electric meters.

RCEA's analysis of the site indicates the project would meet the requirements of PG&E's Aggregated Net Energy Metering (NEM-2A) program which allows for the installation of one solar array that would offset the electricity from multiple qualified benefitting electric accounts. This program requires that all meters in an arrangement be owned or controlled by one entity and all meters must be on the same parcel or contiguous parcels. Figure 4 below shows the five (5) meters located on the Arcata Community Center in red and parcel boundary in yellow.

4.5 Analysis Results and Costs

RCEA has a recent history with solar PV installations for public works projects in California's Proposition 39 program. The average installed price of a roof-mounted solar PV system, including all labor, materials, engineering, permitting and design has typically been about \$3.50/DC watt. Assumptions and inputs for RCEA's financial analysis are listed in **Appendix B**. An average installed price of \$3.50/DC watt yields a combined PV cost of approximately \$381,000; the system would have a simple payback period of 15.6 years. Table 6 below shows a summary of the analysis results for a combined 109 kW DC of solar PV at the Arcata Community Center site.

5 CEC Loan Financing

The California Energy Commission's (CEC's) Energy Conservation Assistance Act (ECAA) makes 1% interest loans available to cities, counties, and special districts for energy efficiency and renewable energy projects. The potential roof mounted solar array and the LED lighting upgrades at Arcata's Community Center would qualify for this funding source. The CEC's ECAA loan is a 1% interest loan, the loan amortization is based on the estimated savings from the energy projects. The payback period begins one year after project completion allowing the city to bank the energy savings dollars which would be used for the loan repayment. Because the loan is paid for by the annual energy savings to the city, the loan is revenue neutral and functions similar to an "on-bill" finance program. The ECAA loan funding is made available on a reimbursement basis for qualified energy expenditures. RCEA has researched the loan requirements and believes the described projects would qualify for loan funding. RCEA can help put together a loan application package for the City of Arcata to apply for the CEC's ECAA loan program if the City Council votes to approve applying for these funds. The table below shows a summary of the energy efficiency and solar PV options at Arcata's Community Center.

6 Audit Methodologies

6.1 Lighting

RCEA staff performed an area-by-area, walk through audit of the interior lighting at the Arcata Community Center. In addition, RCEA audited the exterior, pole-mounted sports lighting used at the two ballfields. City staff was able to provide specifications and wattages for the existing fixtures to supplement RCEA's data collection. The data from the lighting audits was then entered into the Modified Lighting Calculator (MLC) (version 13.1.1) that is accepted by the California Public Utilities Commission for custom, calculated lighting projects that are incentivized through RCEA's Elect-to-Administer, direct-install energy efficiency programs. The MLC was used to generate estimates of energy and cost savings for the project. RCEA worked with their partner contractor to get a quote in order to estimate the cost of the project for the loan application

6.2 Solar Photovoltaics

RCEA analyzed the required PV system size to offset almost 110% of the kWh consumed from the five (5) electric meters associated with this site including the Community Center, north ballfield lights, south ballfield lights, parking lot lights and city maintenance shop. RCEA downloaded insolation data from PV Watts for global horizontal irradiance on a flat plane. Table 8 below shows the insolation data on a horizontal plane; Table 9 shows insolation at an azimuth of 215° (near due south) on a surface tilted to 14°.

RCEA's system sizing methodology is adopted from and detailed in *Photovoltaic Systems* by James Dunlop. Module specs are based on Q-Cell Peak-G5 335-watt modules. Inverter efficiency and MPPT efficiency are based

on a SMA-TL-US inverter. The equations below outline the system sizing process; tables 10 and 11 show the actual values used in the calculations for the south facing array at the Community Center, the supporting workbook contains the same detailed calculations for all the arrays proposed for this project.

RCEA's system sizing methodology starts with the daily energy production goal, derived by dividing the total, annual kWh consumed on site by 365. RCEA uses a "peak sun hours" method of system sizing where 1000 watts/m²/day is one "peak sun hour" corresponding to the Standard Test Conditions (STC) under which the solar modules are given their name-plate rating (Solar Energy International, 2013). This is divided by the average daily insolation to estimate a required inverter AC output (EQ 1).

INTRODUCTION:

LCTOP is one of several programs that are part of the Transit, Affordable Housing, and Sustainable Communities Program established by the California Legislature in 2014 by Senate Bill 862 (SB 862). The LCTOP was created to provide operating and capital assistance for transit agencies to reduce greenhouse gas emissions and improve mobility, with a priority on serving disadvantaged communities. Approved projects in LCTOP will support new or expanded bus or rail services, expand intermodal transit facilities, and may include equipment acquisition, fueling, maintenance and other costs to operate those services or facilities, with each project required to reduce greenhouse gas emissions.

DISCUSSION:

Staff was notified by the Humboldt County Association of Governments (HCAOG) in February 2023 that there was \$3,597 in LCTOP funds available to the City of Arcata (A&MRTS).

The City submitted a request to the Humboldt County Association of Governments (HCAOG) in early March 2023 for \$10,403 in regional funds in addition to our dedicated funding of \$3,597 for the creation of a free bus ride program in July 2023 and June of 2024, and approval was granted by HCAOG.

It is our goal to advertise and get new users to try the bus for free during the summer months and see it as a viable transportation method within the City. It has been a longstanding goal to offer a free

transit service, and through the receipt of these LCTOP funds we are able to run the program in the City in the summer months.

A formal application will submitted to the State by the due date of May 1, 2023, approval is this resolution is a component of that application which we will be included in the final application packet.

BUDGET/FISCAL IMPACT:

No fiscal impact to the Transit revenues as this will be counted as fare box revenue and it will exceed the historical cash fare box revenues we receive during the summer months of June and July.

RECOMMENDATION:

It is recommended that the Council request the annual Engineer's Report and preparation of notices to declare the City's intention to continue to levy and collect assessments of existing assessment districts to include Mad River Parkway Business Center Landscape Maintenance Assessment District, Windsong Subdivision Landscape Maintenance Assessment District and Janes Creek Meadow Landscape Maintenance Assessment District.

INTRODUCTION:

The City has three assessment districts that are billed annually as part of their property tax assessments. As required under the Landscape and Lighting Act of 1972, annual Engineer's Reports and Resolutions of Intent to continue to levy assessments are required. The Resolutions of Intent are incorporated into the City's annual budget process. This action directs the City Engineer to complete the required reports and notices in preparation of the budget adoption.

BACKGROUND:

The City is allowed under the Landscaping and Lighting Act of 1972 to create assessment districts to install, maintain and service public landscaping and lighting. All three of the districts were legally created based on an Engineer's Report which clearly describes the improvements, work and costs. Several specific parts (A-F) are required to be prepared under the Engineer's Report, including:

Part A—plans and specifications for the improvements are filed with the City Clerk. Although separately bound, the plans and specifications are a part of this report and are included in it by reference.

Part B—an estimate of the cost of maintaining the improvement.

Part C—an assessment of the estimated cost of maintaining the improvement on each benefited parcel of land within the assessment district.

Part D—a statement of the method by which the undersigned has determined the amount proposed to be assessed against each parcel.

Part E—a list of the names and addresses of the owners of real property within the assessment district, as shown on the last equalized assessment roll for taxes, or as known to the Clerk. The list is keyed to Part C by assessment number.

Part F—a diagram showing all of the parcels or real property within this assessment district. The diagram is keyed to Part C by assessment number.

DISCUSSION:

Annually, an Engineer's Report is required to be prepared to report to the City Council so they may adopt a resolution proposing any new improvements or substantial changes in existing improvements. There are no changes recommended within the Windsong and Janes Creek Meadow Assessment Districts. The Mad River Parkway will see a CPI increase of 8% per the approved conditions of the district. City forces will continue to perform the work/improvements and maintenance as per the original Engineer's Report, and request the continued assessment of the benefited parcels.

Please refer to the three attached reports for the districts, including the funds required and expended. Written public notifications will be published in the local paper and following a public hearing the Council will be asked to approve the Engineer's Reports and to adopt a resolution for each individual district, declaring the continued collection of assessments.

BUDGET/FISCAL IMPACT:

Failure to approve the continued assessments would result in a reduction of funds to maintain the grounds and lighting within the three assessment districts. The total funding recommended in the Engineer's Reports for the three districts is \$37,974.38.

A: OVERVIEW

The City of Arcata ("City") annually levies and collects special assessments on parcels within the Landscape and Lighting Assessment District Titled Mad River Parkway Business Center Landscape Maintenance Assessment District in order to continue the maintenance of landscape and lighting improvements within the "District". The District was formed in December of 2013 and is levied annually, pursuant to the Landscape and Lighting Act of 1972, Part 2 of Division 15 of the California Streets and Highways Code (the "1972 Act") and the provisions of the California Constitution Article XIIID, added by Proposition 218. This Engineer's Annual Report ("Report") describes the District, any changes to the District, modifications to the improvements or zones, and the proposed assessments for fiscal year 2023/2024.

The budgets and annual assessments are based on the City's estimated cost to maintain the improvements that provide special benefits to properties within the District. The word "parcel", for the purposes of this Report, refers to an individual property assigned its own Assessment Parcel Number by the Humboldt County Assessor's Office. The Humboldt County Auditor/Controller uses Assessment Parcel Numbers and specific Fund Numbers to identify properties assessed for special district benefit assessments on the tax roll.

Each fiscal year, an Engineer's Report is prepared and presented to the City Council describing the District any changes to the District or improvements and the proposed budget and assessments for that fiscal year and the City Council shall hold a noticed public hearing regarding these matters prior to approving and ordering the proposed levy of assessments.

Following final approval of the Report the Council orders the levy and collection of assessments for the fiscal year pursuant to the 1972 Act. In such case, the assessment information will be submitted to the County Auditor/Controller, and included on the property tax roll for each parcel in fiscal year 2023/2024.

B. DESCRIPTION OF THE DISTRICT

The Mad River Parkway Businesses Center Landscape Maintenance Assessment District (MRAD) consists of 11 lots (previously 14) totally 354,959 square feet. Two of the lots have been developed and two are currently in construction.

The subdivision is situated in the northern portion of the City of Arcata just southeast of the Mad River and North of Guintoli Lane. The MRAD contains a City owned parcel known as Carlson Park.

C. IMPROVEMENTS AND SERVICES AUTHORIZED BY THE 1972 ACT

As generally defined by the 1972 Act and applicable to this District, the improvements and associated assessments may include one or more of the following:

1. The installation or planting of landscaping;

- 2. The installation or construction of statuary, fountains, and other ornamental structures and facilities;
- 3. The installation or construction of public lighting facilities including, but not limited to street lights and traffic signals;
- 4. The installation or construction of any facilities which are appurtenant to any of the foregoing or which are necessary or convenient for the maintenance or servicing thereof;
- 5. The installation of park or recreational improvements, including, but not limited to, all of the following: a) Land preparation, such as grading, leveling, cutting and filling, sod, landscaping, irrigation systems, sidewalks, and drainage. b) Lights, playground equipment, play courts, and public restrooms.
- 6. The acquisition of land for park, recreational, or open-space purposes or any existing improvement otherwise authorized pursuant to this section.
- 7. The maintenance or servicing, of any of the foregoing including the furnishing of services and materials for the ordinary and usual maintenance, operation, and servicing of any improvement including but not limited to: a) Repair, removal, or replacement of all or any part of any improvements; b) Grading, clearing, removal of debris, the installation or construction of curbs, gutters, walls, sidewalks, or paving, or water, irrigation, drainage, or electrical facilities; c) Providing for the life, growth, health, and beauty of landscaping, including cultivation, irrigation, trimming, spraying, fertilizing, or treating for disease or injury; d) The removal of trimmings, rubbish, debris, and other solid waste; e) The cleaning, sandblasting, and painting of walls and other improvements to remove or cover graffiti; f) Electric current or energy, gas, or other illuminating agent for any public lighting facilities or for the lighting or operation of any other improvements; g) Water for the irrigation of any landscaping, the operation of any fountains, or the maintenance of any other improvements.
- 8. Incidental expenses associated with the improvements including, but not limited to: a) The cost of preparation of the report, including plans, specifications, estimates, diagram, and assessment; b) The costs of printing, advertising, and the publishing, posting and mailing of notices; c) Compensation payable to the County for collection of assessments; d) Compensation of any engineer or attorney employed to render services; e) Any other expenses incidental to the construction, installation, or maintenance and servicing of the improvements; f) Costs associated with any elections held for the approval of a new or increased assessment.

D. DESCRIPTION OF IMPROVEMENTS AND SERVICES

The purpose of this District is to ensure the ongoing maintenance, operation and servicing of local landscaping and street lighting improvements established or installed in connection with development of properties within the MRAD. The improvements may consist of all or a portion of the public landscaped areas, street lighting and appurtenant facilities within and adjacent to the MRAD.

The improvements to be maintained and funded entirely or partially through the District assessments are generally described as in the original Engineers report: Seven street lights, landscape areas within the street right-of-way, the park area field, equipment, a-ten foot wide path and vegetated swales, graffiti abatement, and a bridge/drainage structure for access and handrail.

Landscaping and Appurtenant Facilities: Landscaping improvements include but are not limited to: Landscaping, planting, shrubbery, trees, irrigation systems, fences, hardscapes, fixtures, electricity and water, sidewalk maintenance resulting from landscape growth and appurtenant facilities in public rights-of-way, medians, swales, parkways and dedicated easements within the proposed boundaries of said Assessment District. Together with any and all incidental expenses in connection there with as particularly authorized pursuant to the Landscaping and Lighting Act of 1972.

<u>Excluded from the District's Responsibility</u>: Fences throughout the Development other than the fence on the West side and within Lot 12.

Vegetation Management

Vegetation Management includes but is not limited to the mowing and trimming of identified drainage easements, street frontage, Carlson Park (lot 12) and other landscape areas.

Lighting and Appurtenant Facilities

Street lighting improvements include but are not limited to: Poles, fixtures, bulbs, conduits, conductors, equipment including guys, anchors, posts and pedestals, metering devices and appurtenant facilities as required to provide safety lighting and traffic signals in public rights-of-way and dedicated easements within the proposed boundaries of said Assessment District. The public lighting system is maintained to provide adequate illumination. Power for street lights is furnished by the Pacific Gas and Electric Company, and based on the rates for power authorized by the California Public Utilities Commission LS2-A rate.

Park and Recreation Improvements and Appurtenant Facilities

Parks and recreation improvements include but are not limited to lights, playgrounds, playground equipment, park furniture, site amenities, and appurtenant facilities in public parks and recreation facilities within the boundaries of said Assessment District.

E: Recent Changes and Proposed Changes for 2023/24 Fiscal Year

No changes in the FY22-23, however we anticipate new construction at least on one or two lots on FY 23-24.

F: ASSESSMENT

The annual assessments are based on the historical and estimated costs to maintain the improvements that provide a prescribed benefit to properties within the District. Per the original language of this assessment district properties not yet developed only pay 50% of the annual assessment. A CPI of 8.0% for 2023-2024 will be calculated and included in the report forwarded to the County for inclusion on the parcel annual tax assessment.

A: OVERVIEW

The City of Arcata ("City") annually levies and collects special assessments on parcels within the Landscape Assessment District Titled Windsong Landscape Maintenance Assessment District (WLAD) in order to continue the maintenance of landscape improvements within the "District". The District was formed in October 1995 and is levied annually, pursuant to the Landscape and Lighting Act of 1972, Part 2 of Division 15 of the California Streets and Highways Code (the "1972 Act") and the provisions of the California Constitution Article XIIID, added by Proposition 218. This Engineer's Annual Report ("Report") describes the District, any changes to the District, modifications to the improvements or zones, and the proposed assessments for fiscal year 2023/2024.

The budgets and annual assessments are based on the City's estimated cost to maintain the improvements that provide special benefits to properties within the District. The word "parcel", for the purposes of this Report, refers to an individual property assigned its own Assessment Parcel Number by the Humboldt County Assessor's Office. The Humboldt County Auditor/Controller uses Assessment Parcel Numbers and specific Fund Numbers to identify properties assessed for special district benefit assessments on the tax roll.

Each fiscal year, an Engineer's Report is prepared and presented to the City Council describing the District any changes to the District or improvements and the proposed budget and assessments for that fiscal year and the City Council shall hold a noticed public hearing regarding these matters prior to approving and ordering the proposed levy of assessments.

Following final approval of the Report the Council orders the levy and collection of assessments for the fiscal year pursuant to the 1972 Act. In such case, the assessment information will be submitted to the County Auditor/Controller, and included on the property tax roll for each parcel in fiscal year 2023/2024.

B. DESCRIPTION OF THE DISTRICT

The Windsong Landscape Maintenance Assessment District (WLAD) consists of 110 single family lots (previously 43 lots.) Five of the lots remain undeveloped.

The subdivision is situated along the western border of Arcata adjacent to the bottoms, north of HWY 255, east of V Street, south of Vaissade Road and west of Lorelei Road. The WLAD contains a City owned parcel known as Windsong Park (1.77 Ac.) and several landscaped/vegetated parcels which the City maintains for aesthetics and drainage purposes.

C. IMPROVEMENTS AND SERVICES AUTHORIZED BY THE 1972 ACT

As generally defined by the 1972 Act and applicable to this District, the improvements and associated assessments may include one or more of the following:

1. The installation or planting of landscaping;

- 2. The installation or construction of statuary, fountains, and other ornamental structures and facilities;

- 5. The installation of park or recreational improvements, including, but not limited to, all of the following: a) Land preparation, such as grading, leveling, cutting and filling, sod, landscaping, irrigation systems, sidewalks, and drainage. b) Lights, playground equipment, play courts, and public restrooms.
- 6. The acquisition of land for park, recreational, or open-space purposes or any existing improvement otherwise authorized pursuant to this section.
- 7. The maintenance or servicing, of any of the foregoing including the furnishing of services and materials for the ordinary and usual maintenance, operation, and servicing of any improvement including but not limited to: a) Repair, removal, or replacement of all or any part of any improvements; b) Grading, clearing, removal of debris, the installation or construction of curbs, gutters, walls, sidewalks, or paving, or water, irrigation, drainage, or electrical facilities; c) Providing for the life, growth, health, and beauty of landscaping, including cultivation, irrigation, trimming, spraying, fertilizing, or treating for disease or injury; d) The removal of trimmings, rubbish, debris, and other solid waste; e) The cleaning, sandblasting, and painting of walls and other improvements to remove or cover graffiti; f) Electric current or energy, gas, or other illuminating agent for any public lighting facilities or for the lighting or operation of any other improvements; g) Water for the irrigation of any landscaping, the operation of any fountains, or the maintenance of any other improvements.
- 8. Incidental expenses associated with the improvements including, but not limited to: a) The cost of preparation of the report, including plans, specifications, estimates, diagram, and assessment; b) The costs of printing, advertising, and the publishing, posting and mailing of notices; c) Compensation payable to the County for collection of assessments; d) Compensation of any engineer or attorney employed to render services; e) Any other expenses incidental to the construction, installation, or maintenance and servicing of the improvements; f) Costs associated with any elections held for the approval of a new or increased assessment.

D. DESCRIPTION OF IMPROVEMENTS AND SERVICES

The purpose of this District is to ensure the ongoing maintenance and servicing of the landscaped areas within the street right of way, playfield (park), playground and other operations and servicing of local landscaping and drainage improvements. The improvements in general include playground equipment and furniture, irrigation system, and public trail areas. The improvements to be maintained and funded entirely or partially through the District assessments are generally described as in the original Engineers report.

<u>Landscaping and Appurtenant Facilities</u>: Landscaping improvements include but are not limited to: Landscaping, planting, shrubbery, trees, irrigation systems, fences, hardscapes, fixtures, electricity and water, sidewalk maintenance resulting from landscape growth and appurtenant

facilities in public rights-of-way, medians, swales, parkways and dedicated easements within the proposed boundaries of said Assessment District. Together with any and all incidental expenses in connection there with as particularly authorized pursuant to the Landscaping and Lighting Act of 1972.

Power for street lights is furnished by the Pacific Gas and Electric Company, and based on the rates for power authorized by the California Public Utilities Commission LS2-A rate.

Park and Recreation Improvements and Appurtenant Facilities

Parks and recreation improvements include but are not limited to lights, playgrounds, playground equipment, park furniture, site amenities, and appurtenant facilities in public parks and recreation facilities within the boundaries of said Assessment District.

E: Recent Changes and Proposed Changes for 2023/24 Fiscal Year

No changes to report for this past FY (22/23), City continued to provide the maintenance and improvements above the amount received from the District. No changes in the rate of assessment are proposed in the next FY 23-24.

The annual assessments are based on the historical and estimated costs to maintain the improvements that provide a prescribed benefit to properties within the District. The most complete assessment (FY21/22) is based on cost data recorded from the Parks and Facilities Department principally, plus the preparation of this report. No CPI was included in this District and thus the costs have not increased over time while the costs to deliver services has. Each parcel within the District is responsible for paying \$135/parcel based on the approved Engineers Estimate.

RECOMMENDATION:

Staff recommends the Council receive a report on the zoning and land use designations for the Mad River Community Hospital and provide direction as necessary.

INTRODUCTION:

This report addresses the background on the Mad River Community Hospital's special considerations in the City's General Plan and Land Use Code. It also describes the process needed to amend the special considerations and/or rezone the property for other uses. This report comes at the request of the Council.

BACKGROUND:

The Mad River Community Hospital campus encompasses four parcels at 3800 Janes Road. The main campus is on Assessor's Parcel Nos. 507-191-033 and -076. The other two parcels are largely vacant. The property is designated Public Facilities and has a special consideration in the General Plan and the Land Use Code (Attachment A, SCP 8). Central to the special consideration is the requirement to conserve 50 percent of the total campus area in open space. There was an additional requirement that the Hospital obtain approval for a "master plan" demonstrating the 50 percent open space and developable areas. The Hospital received this approval in around 2014 (Attachment B).

Among other uses, the special consideration allows for residential uses consistent and compatible with hospital uses. Examples include workforce housing, long-term care, and other uses that could be expected in conjunction with hospital uses.

The Council asked for a report on the current status and the process for adding other uses.

DISCUSSION:

The requirements stated above are embedded in the General Plan, the Land Use Code. They may also be cited in the ordinance implementing the Planned Development Combining Zone on the property.

The master plan has been adopted by the City's Planning Commission. The master plan could be amended to reflect a revised placement of structures and open space to accommodate a revised planned build out. If the Hospital wishes to start development, the Zoning Administrator could find a newly revised master plan substantially consistent with the approved plan if it met the special consideration requirements.

If the Hospital wishes to amend or remove the special consideration, the process would require a General Plan amendment, a Land Use Code text amendment, and potentially a Planned Development amendment. These changes would need to be supported by environmental analysis, which could include up to an EIR. Staff will provide an update on this at the meeting.

POLICY IMPLICATIONS:

This item is exploratory and does not have policy implications. Any action may have implications that will be noted at such time they are concrete.

COMMITTEE/COMMISSION REVIEW:

None.

ENVIRONMENTAL REVIEW (CEQA):

This update is not a project pursuant to CEQA.

BUDGET/FISCAL IMPACT:

This action is a de minimus impact on the budget. Any amendments would require application and full cost recovery.

RECOMMENDATION:

Staff recommends:

- 1) The full Council provide direction to staff and the Planning Commission regarding the timeline for producing a public review draft of, and recommendation for, the General Plan update; and
- 2) The Council members that are not otherwise conflicted provide direction to staff and the Planning Commission regarding the timeline for producing a public review draft of, and recommendation for, the Gateway Area Plan Element and its associated Form-Based Code.

INTRODUCTION:

The sitting members of the Council directed staff at their March 1 meeting to redirect the efforts to develop the Form-Based Code (Code) away from the scheduled public engagement events that were planned in the scope approved in January 2023, (and have been drawing few new residents to the process), and to focus on the preparation of a draft of the Code for public review as soon as possible. The sitting members further directed the Planning Commission to provide a recommendation on the Gateway element of the General Plan along with the non-Gateway General Plan updates and new Code by July of 2023. This is consistent with timelines established in 2022 and shared with the Council in 2022, January 2023, and discussed most recently by the Council during on March 1, 2023. Because only those Councilmember who are eligible to participate in the Gateway element discussion were part of the most recent review of the timeline, some members of the public, and a Planning Commissioner, have raised procedural concerns about the Council's direction. This item is to review milestones established to meet this timeline and to reconsider or ratify the Council's direction from the March 1, 2023, meeting.

DISCUSSION:

The Planning Commission, Committees, and public are currently evaluating the various

elements of the General Plan. The City's consultant is working on the draft Form-Based Code associated with the Gateway Area Plan for review by the Planning Commission in June. The major milestones leading to adoption based on the current direction from the Council include:

- 1) Release of all draft work product (June 2023);
- 2) Initial Recommendation from Planning Commission (July 11, 2023);
- 3) Draft EIR release (summer 2023);
- 4) Council review and direction (summer 2023);
- 5) Continued public engagement on draft work product (summer-fall 2023);
- 6) EIR Certification (early 2024);
- 7) Adoption of General Plan and associated codes (early 2024 after EIR).

Engagement Timeline

To meet the first two milestones, the Commission has established a timeline (Table 1) and a framework for its deliberations. The timeline establishes the Elements and Gateway topics that will be addressed by the Commission. The timeline may be updated periodically to reflect changes in progress or priorities. While this timeline addresses upcoming meetings, the schedule outlining the Commission's prior review is located at https://www.cityofarcata.org/940/Ongoing-Community-Outreach. The Planning Commission is currently reviewing each General Plan Elements and will review the Form-Based Code in June.

Grant Update

The General Plan update is largely funded by grants that have completion deadlines at the end of 2023 and funds are almost fully expended for all grant sources. The grant agencies require an adopted work product to be submitted by the end of the grant term. The outstanding grants include the Sustainable Agricultural Lands Conservation, SB2, and Local Early Action

Planning grants.

The Sustainable Agricultural Lands Conservation (SALC) grant deadline is January 31, 2024. The City has already received a 12-month extension (original grant term expiring January 31, 2023). The deadline may be further extended in unique circumstances. Staff are working with Department of Conservation (Department) staff to seek further extension. The Department staff are reviewing the possibility of accepting Council endorsement of a draft Plan to meet grant deadlines, recognizing the EIR may not be completed. The SALC grant is \$250,000.

The SB2 and Local Early Action Planning (LEAP) grant deadline for funds expenditures and reimbursements is December 31, 2023. The City has already received an 18-month extension (original expenditure deadline June 30, 2022). The grant closeout deadline is June 30, 2024, and it cannot be extended. The State Housing and Community Development (HCD) requires an adopted work product to be submitted by the end of the grant term. Missing the grant deadline would require repayment totaling \$225,000.

Both HCD and the Strategic Growth Council have lauded the City's efforts and the planning work we are doing. This work has resulted in recognition in several ways. For example, the City was invited to speak on a panel at the joint hearing of the Senate Housing Committee and the Assembly Housing and Community Development Committee in February of 2023 led by Senator Scott Wiener and Assembly Member Buffy Wicks. The City was invited to this event on the recommendation of HCD Housing Policy team due to their experience with our implementation of these grants.

ENVIRONMENTAL REVIEW (CEQA):

This is just an update and is not a project pursuant to CEQA. The General Plan updates, including the Gateway Area Plan, and the proposed form-based code, are being analyzed through a Program Environmental Impact Report. The General Plan updates will be able to be adopted once the Environmental Impact Report is completed.

BUDGET/FISCAL IMPACT:

The fiscal impact of this update is negligible. The impact of the overall planning work is evaluated in the approval reports.
