A. Request for City Funding for Arcata 2024 Community Emergency Response Team (CERT) Basic Training.

The Arcata Community Emergency Response Team (CERT) is requesting support to offer thirty (30) Arcata residents and community members a Basic CERT course in disaster preparedness and response in calendar year 2024. The estimated cost of the 23-hour course is \$5,600 and the Humboldt CERT Coalition, a 501(C)(3), is requesting \$3,000 from the City Council.

RECOMMENDATION:

It is recommended that the Council allocate \$3,000 to the Arcata CERT team to provide a 23-hour Basic CERT course for the Arcata community in FY 2024 from the \$15,000 budgeted for Community Support in the current fiscal year budget.

B. Receive an Update on the Regional Climate Action Plan (CAP) and Support the County of Humboldt's Revised Proposal for Completion of the CAP.

The City has been working regionally on a Climate Action Plan (CAP), and a draft was completed in June 2022. In the Summer of 2022, Humboldt County entered into contract with Rincon Consultants, Inc., to begin work on the Environmental Impact Report.

During their review of the Draft CAP, Rincon identified concerns that the Draft CAP, as written, did not provide substantial evidence needed to demonstrate its ability to meet Greenhouse Gas (GHG) reduction targets to gain "Qualified" status by the state.

To continue to meet the identified goal of achieving a Qualified CAP, Rincon has proposed revising the Draft CAP. This staff report and its attachments describe the proposed strategies for revision, which the Humboldt County Board of Supervisors approved at its October 17, 2023, meeting. Staff is recommending that the Arcata City Council support the County in its actions to continue to meet the goal of achieving a Qualified CAP.

RECOMMENDATION:

It is recommended that the Council:

- 1) Receive an Update on the Regional Climate Action Plan (CAP); and,
- 2) Support the County of Humboldt's Revised Proposal for Completion of the CAP.

C. Potential Tax Measure for November 2024.

The City Council has identified priority projects for Fiscal Year 2023-24, many of which are ongoing goals requiring either a shift in current resources to fund or an additional revenue source. These include efforts to combat homelessness and its impacts, mitigation of and adaptation to climate change, continued and possibly expanded public safety alternative response programs such as Community Ambassador Program and Mobile Intervention Services Team (MIST), and infrastructure improvements including safe streets, transit, alternative transportation, parks and trails, and Valley West Improvements. This staff report addresses some opportunities for potential ballot measures on November 5, 2024, to support one or all of those priorities.

RECOMMENDATION:

It is recommended that the Council consider providing staff direction on potential revenue sources to fund City Council Priorities as a ballot measure for the November 5, 2024, general election.

D. Introduce Ordinance No. 1565, Amending Title VII, Chapter 2, of the Arcata Municipal Code Pertaining to the Use of Public Sewers and Pretreatment of Wastewater, Waive Reading of the Text and Consent to Read by Title Only; and Adopt an Enforcement Response Plan for the Sewer Chapter of the Arcata Municipal Code.

Title VII, Chapter 2, Sewer Use Ordinance codifies federal pretreatment program rules that the City of Arcata is required to implement under its National Pollutant Discharge Elimination System Permit. The Enforcement Response Plan (ERP) is a required element of the pretreatment program. The ERP outlines the procedures followed by the City of Arcata to identify, document, and respond to violations of the Sewer Use Ordinance. Ordinance No. 1565 amends the Sewer Use Ordinance to include required language regarding the Reports of Changed Conditions and Bypass. These amendments incorporate required and optional pretreatment program changes and will ensure that the Sewer Use Ordinance addresses all the legal authorities required by federal regulation.

RECOMMENDATION:

It is recommended that the Council:

- Introduce Ordinance No. 1565, An Ordinance of the City Council of the City of Arcata Adding Sections 7472.5(F) and 7492.6, Bypass, to Chapter 2, Sewers, of Title VII, Public Works, of the Arcata Municipal Code; waive reading of the text and consent to read by title only; and
- 2) Adopt an Enforcement Response Plan for the Sewer Chapter of the Arcata Municipal Code.

E. Receive a Presentation on the Ralph M. Brown Act.

The Ralph M. Brown Act is an important piece of legislation regulating the conduct of public meetings. There have been several amendments to the Act since 2019. This item will provide information to the Council and an opportunity for Councilmembers to ask questions of the City Attorney about the Act.

RECOMMENDATION:

Staff recommends the Council receive a presentation by Doug White, City Attorney, on the Brown Act; consider questions and comments among Councilmembers; and receive public comment.

F. Consider Amendments to the City Council Protocol Manual.

The City Council Protocol Manual, last updated in 2021, provides a framework and expectations for City governance. It describes the norms and practices for Councilmembers in interacting with each other, the public, and staff, as well as providing reference to important material to assist Councilmembers in their official duties. The manual is intended to be reviewed and updated biennially in July following a City Council election. This was delayed pending the City Attorney transition to allow the new legal team an opportunity to review and advise the Council on potential updates. This item provides a forum for discussing

amendments to the City Council Protocol Manual.

RECOMMENDATION:

Staff recommends the City Council receive a presentation from the City Manager and City Attorney; discuss potential amendments to the protocol manual; receive public comment; and provide direction to staff regarding updates to the protocol manual.
