Good morning,

I just wanted to touch base with some (hopefully) clarifying guidance regarding Resource Requests for PPE, specifically N95 Masks:

Per the Governor's Declaration, yesterday, there is a cache of N95 Masks at the state level. However, it is important to note that this cache is **EXPIRED**.

Per the CDPH guidance (attached) that was released recently, these masks MAY be used once all **UNEXPIRED** PPE has been depleted.

I have attached the link to the CDPH FAQ here:

The process for ordering these Masks is as follows:

- 1. Perform an inventory and stock evaluation of all N95 Masks available at your Facility/Agency/Operational Area.
- 2. Identify the number of UNEXPIRED and EXPIRED N95 Masks, as identified in the NIOSH document (attached)
 - a. If you have **UNEXPIRED** PPE, please determine the burn rate, for the items.
- 3. Determine the expected date that **UNEXPIRED** PPE will be depleted.
- 4. Determine the amount of **EXPIRED** PPE and the expected burn rate.
- 5. Before running out of all PPE, create a Resource Request, to be delivered to your County MHOAC.
 - a. The Resource Request must state that **EXPIRED** PPE is acceptable.
- 6. The MHOAC will send the Resource Request (attached) to the Regional Disaster Medical Health Specialist, for delivery to the State.
- 7. The State will determine the availability and fulfill the request, as possible.

Don,

In short, this looks really good and accurate. We have made a COVID-19 collection fact sheet and it is being reviewed by our CD team today. I can attach it for reference but please note it is a DRAFT and a final one may be available tomorrow. Please communicate to the courier line any collection kit needs and we will get you a stock.

As far as TAT, we are in a testing transition right now so it varies. We are now using VRDL (State Lab) for testing M-Th and CDC for testing Fri – Sun. TAT varies because of shipping and also number of samples in the queue at each of these labs.

<u>General TAT</u>:

CDC – up to 1 week (hoping sooner as more labs start to test) – we have seen 72hrs once they have the sample

Local Testing Plan:

We are approved to perform this test here in our lab. I am just waiting on reagents to be delivered. They are on order but waiting for CDC to distribute them... we are expecting by the end of this week. After I have reagents, it will take me one day to get the test validated and we will be operation. As you stated in your email, this will change quite a bit over time. At the beginning we will test a lot and that will lessen with time. I plan to open 7 days a week for testing with one PCR run/day – up to 16 samples (8 patients). Maybe more depending on other workload. A lot to still work out including courier as I do not have courier on the weekend. If your staff can deliver samples that will make it easier and a faster response. Ill need samples in my hand, clearly labeled by 9 am daily for results by 5pm. The test takes about 6-8 hours depending on the number of samples tested. Our TAT will be 24-72 hours and trying to get these out ASAP.

The above is subject to change but maybe it will help a little. I gotta run so if you want to talk later we can ☺ Sorry for brevity – kinda swamped ☺ Let me know if you have any questions. Take care!

Note: I also have this set-up in my LIMS. We really need to get this HIE stuff worked out. I would like you all to be able to order this test electronically and get results electronically but I need your help setting that up with OCHIIN and EPIC. Otherwise it will be hand written reqs and fax results. I'm including Keenan Hinz as he has been giving me LIMS support and resolving our HIE issues is a project I would like his help on.

I know life is nuts right now, but I wanted to send along what I planned to pass during our Communicable Disease meeting we're holding at noon today. The information I have is specific for our sites and capabilities, but I wanted to let you know what it is the Open Door labs are doing.

Specimen Collection for COVID-19

Here are a few things to consider for our facilities when asked to collect specimens on PUI.

- Nasopharyngeal AND Oropharyngeal swabs are required for PUI
 - Minimum licensure for Nasopharyngeal collections is that of an RN
 - Specimen collection can induce coughing collector should use appropriate PPE
- Serum samples are no longer requested or required
- Sputum specimens may also be submitted in a sterile, screw cap cup
 - Do NOT encourage (induce) sputum production in a patient who is not already expectorating sputum
 - We should think carefully about where we want patients to collect these, as there will certainly be aerosolized particles in the process
- General storage requirements are to keep everything at 2-8 Celsius until we can hand off to PHD

Everything else really is on the sheets provided by CDPH. We have the supplies required for collection at all of our sites. I think we're as ready as we can be for this.

Once it is proven COVID-19 is prevalent in the community, the focus on collection of samples and testing will likely decline. But that shift will come from CDPH and the CDC. Until then I'll make sure all labs have the supplies required for the specimen collections.

There we are. We're doing our best to follow the CDPH/CDC guidance.

I do have a question. What's the turnaround time on new specimens submitted? I know it has changed a bit.

Here is a pass at what a morning report might look like. Note the last item from Del Norte County where they are already doing what Jeremy mentioned yesterday—providing the numbers the state is asking us to track around confirmed cases and numbers quarantined. They don't have test info, obvs, but seemingly everything else. Aside from that information, I focused on articles with changes in or clarification of guidance. Obviously we would have them to you earlier in the day.

Below that is new guidance from the CDC. I talked to CDC PIO staff today, and they do not currently have a system for tracking changes to guidance. They had clearly received the question before and acknowledged the problem and the gap. I had Christine call and get a different PIO, and that person elevated the request to a higher level. We'll see if anything comes of it. For now, I don't know who has the MENSA-like ability to detect minute changes in sheaves of documents each morning. Not me, and not really anyone I know. It's a ridiculous request, and I wonder if we might have to deal with it by assuming major changes in guidance will be tagged and flagged so that no one misses them and that little stuff is just that—little. Not sure what else to recommend.

Except for the things we can't get, is this kind of what you're looking for? Do you have a proposed recipient list?

On Monday, <u>Donald Trump</u> held a meeting in the White House to discuss his Administration's response to *COVID*-19, the novel coronavirus that has spread to every continent except Antarctica. At the time there had been more than a hundred and five thousand cases reported in at least eighty-three countries, leading to more than <u>thirty-five hundred deaths</u>. Seated around an oval table in the Cabinet Room were health experts from the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention, the Food and Drug Administration, and the National Institutes of Health, as well as pharmaceutical executives from Pfizer, Johnson & Johnson, Sanofi, and others. With more than a hundred cases already discovered in the U.S., which had resulted in six deaths (the virus has since infected nearly four hundred people in the U.S., and killed at least nineteen of them), Trump was concerned. But he was also confused, despite having had several previous briefings with the Administration's top health officials. Grasping for some good news, he pressed the executives to deliver a vaccine within a few months, at which point Anthony Fauci, the longtime director of the National Institute of Allergy and Infectious Diseases (N.I.A.I.D.), spoke up. "A vaccine that you make and start testing in a year is not a vaccine that's deployable," he said. The earliest it would be deployable, Fauci added, is "in a year to a year and a half, no matter how fast you go."

The virus seems to have been circulating in the United States, particularly in Washington State, for the past month, and more cases are expected. A person can be infected but asymptomatic, and therefore unknowingly infect other people. This limits the ability of public-health tools to contain its spread. Even still, a *COVID-19* vaccine developed, licensed, and manufactured at a global scale in twelve months would be an unprecedented, remarkable, even revolutionary achievement. No other vaccine has come close to being developed that quickly. The fastest effort to date was during the Zika outbreak, in 2015, when one was ready for testing in about seven months, but the epidemic fizzled out before an approved vaccine could be sent through clinical trials. At the meeting on Monday, Trump said, "I like the sound of a couple months better, if I must be honest."

John Shiver, the global head of vaccine research and development at the multinational pharmaceutical company Sanofi, which is developing a *COVID*-19 vaccine, was at the meeting with Trump. "There was some confusion there," Shiver said, that certain officials did not understand that "being in people," as in human trials, is not the same as having a product. Clinical trials are conducted on healthy people, which is inherently challenging. "You certainly don't want a vaccine that can make it worse," Shiver said. "There have been some vaccine candidates historically that could actually enhance the disease." Sanofi is working with the United States Biomedical Advanced Research and Development Authority, a sort of biomedical *DARPA*, to advance a *COVID*-19 vaccine based largely on the vaccine candidate it had developed for *SARS*. Shiver told me that the authority doesn't expect to have anything ready for human trials until much later this year. "It's difficult," Shiver said, "to see how, even in the case of an emergency, a vaccine could be fully ready for licensure in a year and a half."

The Coalition for Epidemic Preparedness Innovations (CEPI), an Oslo-based nonprofit

organization, was established at Davos, in 2017, to help the world prepare for a "disease X" pandemic. One of its aims is to dramatically hasten the process of vaccine development. To create a viable, scalable vaccine "takes vast amounts of funding and R. & D.," Rachel Grant, the advocacy and communications director at *CEPI*, told me. "It is a long and complex business. It's all doable, science can meet the challenges, but there is lots of attrition" before any vaccine gets to the point of licensure. The problem is twofold. First, there may never be a market for a vaccine at the end of the development process, because the epidemic is contained, or never comes to pass. Then, traditionally, if there is an epidemic, it may take hold in a developing country where the costs of research and development cannot be recouped. "The resources and expertise sit in biotech and pharma, and they've got their business model," Grant said. "They're not charities. They can't do this stuff for free."

CEPI, with funding from the government of Norway, the Gates Foundation, the Wellcome Trust, and several other countries (the United States is not among them), is trying to bridge the gap. The challenge of vaccine development is "what *CEPI* was set up to solve," Grant told me, "played out writ large in an episode like this." Since the novel coronavirus emerged, *CEPI* has ramped up its grant-making expenditures to more than nineteen million dollars. Two grant recipients—a Massachusetts-based biotech startup named Moderna and a lab at the University of Queensland, in Brisbane, Australia—have, remarkably, already developed a vaccine candidate that they will start testing in human trials in the next few months, and another biotech startup supported by *CEPI* is not far behind. But, ultimately, to get three different vaccines through the final phase of clinical testing, Nick Jackson, *CEPI*'s head of programs and innovative technology, told me, will require an estimated two billion dollars.

Barney Graham is the deputy director of the Vaccine Research Center, at the N.I.A.I.D., in Bethesda, Maryland, which is collaborating with Moderna and other academic labs on a possible vaccine. Graham is one of the world's experts on the structure of viruses and how they interact with human cells to make us sick. In the seven years before the COVID-19 virus appeared, one of Graham's projects had involved understanding the MERS coronavirus, in order to potentially develop a vaccine. (MERS, which can be transmitted from camels to humans, has been contained to the Middle East, and seems to spread mostly in confined spaces, like hospitals.) "There's several ways of delivering a protein to a human body that will make a vaccine-type response," he told me. Certain proteins, when injected into a human, are antigenic, provoking the body's immune system to create antibodies. Traditionally, proteins are made "in a microbrewery type of bioreactor," Graham said-a common flu-virus vaccine, for instance, is grown in chicken eggs—and it "takes up to two years to get that protein ready. That is not fast enough if you're in a pandemic situation." Researchers have long been working on so-called vaccine-platform manufacturing technologies for future use. The idea is akin to creating a frozen-yogurt maker for vaccines—same machine, different flavors. With vaccine-platform technologies, the hope is that the way in which the vaccine is manufactured and delivered to the body—such as Moderna's messenger-RNA (mRNA) technology—will transport any antigen and, therefore, theoretically protect against any infectious disease. "You can make the RNA in the same way, purify it in the same way, release it in the same way, and yet make many different proteins," Graham said.

In Moderna's case, the vaccine contains a synthetic version of mRNA. When injected into a muscle cell, the mRNA acts like a drill sergeant, ordering the cell to create a doppelgänger of one of the coronavirus's surface proteins—known as "spikes," which, together, decorate the surface of the virus, giving the appearance of a crown. The spike protein is only part of the

virus and therefore won't make a person sick. But it is a crucial component of how the virus infects a human cell. In a sense, the Moderna technology outsources the labor of building these spike proteins to our own bodies. Once our muscle cells follow the vaccine's mRNA orders, and manufacture loads of these spike-protein doppelgängers, our immune system recognizes them as foreign objects and learns how to fight them by creating antibodies.

Moderna has done several different vaccine trials with its mRNA "platform," a few in partnership with Graham and the Vaccine Research Center. Among other things, they have tested *MERS* coronavirus vaccines in mice.. (There are now, including *COVID*-19, seven known coronaviruses that infect humans, and many more carried by animals; four of them circulate in the population and are responsible for common colds, and the other two are *SARS* and *MERS*.) "The early data we already have with the mice shows it is working the way it should," Graham said. "If this was a virus from a different family, we would not be nearly as prepared."

On the other side of the world, at the University of Queensland, Keith Chappell is working on what he and his two co-inventors call a "molecular clamp," a different type of rapid-response vaccine platform, also funded in part by *CEPI*. The molecular-clamp vaccine uses a more traditional method compared to what Moderna is making; its shot would already contain the spike protein. The big difference is that Chappell's team has found a way to incorporate a labcreated polypeptide (or sequence of amino acids)—"the clamp"—into the spike protein, to insure that the protein remains stable, folded like origami, in precisely the right configuration, thereby provoking a strong, accurate immune response (i.e., lots of appropriate antibodies). After years of working in cell cultures (Chinese-hamster ovaries, or CHO, the standard mammalian cell line used in therapeutic biomedical research), Chappell's team plans to start testing its vaccine on about a hundred healthy adult volunteers, and he estimates that a trial will begin sometime this summer. "It's a terrifying prospect, what's occurring currently," Chappell told me, by phone, from his lab in Brisbane. "It's a lot of weight on our shoulders, and a lot of pressure."

Even if the virus wanes in the warmer months, as does influenza, it will have circulated in the population already, and could reëmerge in the fall. For now, although the total number of infections worldwide is unknown, experts <u>estimate</u>, crudely, that the virus has a mortality rate between 0.5 per cent and two per cent. The flu, which kills, on average, between twenty thousand and forty thousand people each year in this country alone, has a mortality rate of 0.1 per cent. "We're still learning a lot about the virus, what we were all watching for, and what has emerged is that it is readily spread person to person in a community setting, more so than *SARS* or *MERS*," John Mascola, the director of the Vaccine Research Center at the N.I.A.I.D., told me. "That is not surprising, but it is concerning. There is the potential for the virus to really establish itself in a human population, and not go away quickly."

On Tuesday, Trump toured Mascola's Vaccine Research Center, where about five hundred scientists are at work. (On Friday, the President signed an \$8.3 billion emergency-aid package to counter the virus; some of the funds will go toward the Vaccine Research Center's work.) Kizzmekia Corbett, the research fellow leading the *COVID*-19 vaccine team, explained the basics of virology to Trump—a student whom she had not anticipated—and other researchers showed off jumbo models of the coronavirus's spike protein as Trump looked on, nonplussed. "The environment here is one of a lot of excitement," Mascola later told me. "It's gratifying to be recognized by the leadership, but, honestly, a lot of what we do is not recognized at that kind of level, and that really doesn't matter. We do what we do because of the love of the science and our commitment to public health."

From our Regional Disaster Medical Health Specialist about our MHOAC process:

Per the Governor's Declaration, yesterday, there is a cache of N95 Masks at the state level. However, it is important to note that this cache is <mark>EXPIRED</mark>.

Per the CDPH guidance (attached) that was released recently, these masks MAY be used once all **UNEXPIRED** PPE has been depleted.

The process for ordering these Masks is as follows:

- 1. Perform an inventory and stock evaluation of all N95 Masks available at your Facility/Agency/Operational Area.
- 2. Identify the number of **UNEXPIRED** and **EXPIRED** N95 Masks, as identified in the NIOSH document (attached)
 - a. If you have **UNEXPIRED** PPE, please determine the burn rate, for the items.
- 3. Determine the expected date that **UNEXPIRED** PPE will be depleted.
- 4. Determine the amount of **EXPIRED** PPE and the expected burn rate.
- 5. Before running out of all PPE, create a Resource Request, to be delivered to your County MHOAC.
 - a. The Resource Request must state that **EXPIRED** PPE is acceptable.
- 6. The MHOAC will send the Resource Request (attached) to the Regional Disaster Medical Health Specialist, for delivery to the State.
- 7. The State will determine the availability and fulfill the request, as possible.

We want to alert you to the release of CDC's updated Interim U.S. Guidance for Risk Assessment and Public Health Management of Healthcare Personnel with Potential Exposure in a Healthcare Setting to Patients with Coronavirus Disease (COVID-19) now available here https://www.cdc.gov/coronavirus/2019-ncov/hcp/guidance-risk-assesment-hcp

There are several changes we want to highlight in the new guidance compared to the old guidance:

1. In regards to conducting risk assessments for healthcare personnel (HCP) for areas with community transmission: For areas within the U.S. that are demonstrating community transmission, all healthcare personnel (HCP) are considered at some risk for COVID-19 whether through patient interactions or from general community interactions. In these instances, devoting resources to contact tracing and retrospective risk assessment could divert resources from other important infection prevention and control activities. Instead, facilities may decide to shift their emphasis to more routine practices, which includes asking HCP to report recognized exposures, regularly monitor themselves for fever and symptoms of respiratory infection and not reporting to work when ill. Facilities should develop a plan for how they will screen for symptoms and

evaluate ill HCP.

2. In regards to HCP furlough: The old guidance recommended work restrictions for HCP with medium or high risk exposure. In the new guidance, facilities could consider allowing asymptomatic HCP who have had an exposure to a COVID-19 patient to continue to work after consultation with their occupational health program. These HCP should still report temperature and absence of symptoms each day prior to starting work. Facilities could have exposed HCP wear a facemask while at work for the 14 days after the exposure event if there is a sufficient supply of facemasks. If HCP develop even mild symptoms consistent with COVID-19, they must cease patient care activities, don a facemask (if not already wearing), and notify their supervisor or occupational health services prior to leaving work.

3. If a risk assessment is pursued for exposed HCP:

- a. Table 1. Epidemiologic Risk Classification for Asymptomatic Healthcare Personnel Following Exposure to Patients with Coronavirus Disease (COVID-19) or their Secretions/Excretions in a Healthcare Setting, and their Associated Monitoring and Work Restriction Recommendations has been simplified with a focus on presence/absence of source control measures; use of personal protective equipment (PPE) by HCP; and degree of contact with the patient (i.e., prolonged versus brief).
- b. In addition, for those who are assessed as requiring "self-monitoring with delegated supervision" the requirement to actively verify absence of fever and respiratory symptoms when healthcare personnel (HCP) report for work is now optional.
- c. The category of HCP who fully adhered to recommended PPE was removed from Table 1. but is still addressed under section III, #3. These HCP should still perform self-monitoring with delegated supervision as described under the low-risk exposure category.

III. Recommendations for Monitoring Based on COVID-19 Exposure Risk

5. Community or travel-associated exposures

HCP with potential exposures to COVID-19 in community settings, should have their exposure risk assessed according to CDC guidance. HCP should inform their facility's occupational health program that they have had a community or travel-associated exposure. HCP who have a community or travel-associated exposure should undergo monitoring as defined by that guidance. Those who fall into the *high-* or *medium-risk* category described there should be excluded from work in a healthcare setting until 14 days after their exposure. HCP who develop signs or symptoms compatible with COVID-19 should contact their established point of contact (public health authorities or their facility's occupational health program) for medical evaluation prior to returning to work.

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Those HCPs who traveled to Italy fall into the medium risk category based on travel to a country with sustained transmission. According to CDC, those medium risk travelers should be excluded from work in a healthcare setting for 14 days after their exposure.



Several resources are available to help providers and systems leaders prepare for the impact of a coronavirus outbreak. Links to the resources are below. Key take-aways include:

- **Be prepared** by staying informed about your local COVID-19 situation and establish relationships with public health partners in your community
- **Communicate with staff and clients** about facility preparedness and policy updates (i.e. modified hours, non-urgent care by telephone, etc.), and consider using social media to do so

- **Expect** the homelessness services sector workforce to be impacted, and anticipate modified service delivery based on staff capacity
- **Protect your workforce** by screening clients, staff, and visitors for acute respiratory illness, ensuring use of personal protection equipment, and encouraging sick employees to stay home
- **Protect your clients** by separating those with respiratory illnesses, and implementing prevention strategies to minimize exposure (i.e. encouraging frequent hand-washing, increased surface cleaning/disinfection, etc.)
- Take inventory of supplies (hand soap, food, and more) and order more if necessary

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LAC DPH Health Advisory: COVID-19 Guidance--Optimizing N95 Supplies and Managing Mild Illness March 4, 2020

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This message is intended for all health care providers practicing in Los Angeles County. Please distribute as appropriate.

There is a very limited supply of SARS-CoV-2 testing available to Los Angeles County at this time. Until testing is more widely available, testing must be reserved for patients with severe illness and the close contacts of confirmed cases of coronavirus disease 2019 (COVID-19).

Key Messages

- The Los Angeles County Department of Public Health (LAC DPH) is authorizing the adoption of the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC) <u>contingency capacity</u> <u>strategies</u> for healthcare facilities experiencing critical shortages of N95 respirators. LAC DPH has created <u>guidance</u> to allow for the use of N95 respirators beyond their manufacturer-designated shelf life and the limited reuse and extended use of N95 respirators to help with increased demands and decreased supplies.
- Healthcare providers should contact LAC DPH to arrange for SARS-CoV-2 testing for any patients that meet the current LAC DPH COVID-19 Evaluation Criteria outlined in the <u>February 29 LAHAN</u> and included below.
- Due to the very limited supply of SARS-CoV-2 testing available to Los Angeles County at this time, testing is being restricted for use in patients with severe illness and those who are known close contacts to confirmed cases. Patients with mild illness who do not meet the current LAC DPH COVID-19 Evaluation Criteria should be instructed to follow home care instructions and do not need to be reported to LAC DPH.
- Healthcare facilities and clinics are strongly encouraged to communicate with patients, staff, and visitors about the importance of staying home when they have mild cold or flu-like symptoms.

• The CDC is hosting a <u>webinar</u> "COVID-19 Update—What Clinicians Need to Know to Prepare for COVID-19 in the United States" on Thursday March 5 at 11 am PST.

Situation

The COVID-19 disease situation is evolving in the United States with more cases being identified and reported each day. LAC DPH has recently confirmed 6 new cases of COVID-19 bringing the total to 7 confirmed cases to date in LA County. All of the new cases have known or likely sources of exposure and none provide direct evidence of community transmission. None of these cases were linked to the first case reported in a non-resident traveler in January.

This notification is to provide health care providers and facilities with information on maintaining supplies of N95 respirators as well as guidance on the current management of patients with mild illness who do not meet the current criteria for SARS-CoV-2 testing.

NOTE: In anticipation of increased diagnostic testing at clinical laboratories, the CDC has removed the criteria for testing and suggested expanding testing to a wider group of symptomatic patients. Please be aware that this is currently not feasible at the local level. In LA County, the only COVID-19 testing is through the LAC DPH Public Health Lab that has limited testing capacity. Public Health is aware that increased testing is needed by the medical community, is seeking to expand local testing capacity, and will provide updated information to health care providers as this becomes available in the future.

Health care providers are advised to check <u>LAC DPH COVID-19 Healthcare Provider website</u> for the most up to date guidance and resources.

Actions Requested of Providers

- Screen patients for any signs or symptoms of febrile respiratory illness. If present, healthcare workers should don surgical masks. The patient should be instructed to wear a surgical mask and be placed in a private room with the door closed or separated from others by at least 6 feet.
- Assess if the patient meets criteria for testing using the <u>LAC DPH Provider Checklist</u>: Evaluating Patients Who May Have COVID-19. If the patient meets criteria, follow the guidance on additional infection control procedures and contact LAC DPH to approve specimen collection for SARS-CoV-2 testing.
- Manage patients with mild illness at home according to their clinical status. Due to the limited availability of SARS-CoV-2 testing at this time, patients with mild presentations who do not meet the LAC DPH COVID-19 Evaluation Criteria are not eligible to receive SARS-CoV-2 testing and do not need to be reported to DPH. Supportive care is recommended. Instruct patients to follow home care instructions including:
 - Stay home for at least 24 hours after the resolution of febrile illness without the use of fever-reducing medicines.
 - Phone their provider if symptoms worsen.

Note: Consider more active monitoring of older adults and those with co-morbid medical conditions as they may be at higher risk of developing severe disease.

Actions Recommended for Health Care Systems and Clinics

- Distribute messaging to patients about <u>staying home when sick</u> with fever or cold or flu symptoms.
- Post signs asking visitors with fever and/or cold and flu symptoms to defer hospital visits.
- Skilled nursing facilities (SNF) should consider stopping in-person visitation of residents. Instead, virtual visitation using alternative modes of contact such as videoconferencing or telephone should be encouraged. Visitation could introduce COVID-19 into vulnerable SNF populations and should be limited as much as possible until the threat of COVID-19 has diminished.
- Remind all staff to stay home and not come to work if sick with symptoms of febrile respiratory illness until they are free of fever for at least 24 hours without the use of fever-reducing medicines. Defer from requiring a doctor's note for return to work, when possible.
- Create systems to reduce the number of people with mild illness that present for care such as through the use of telephone triage, counseling call line, and any other means available.
- Anticipate a potentially large increase in the number of persons presenting for evaluation and clinical care related to COVID-19 in the coming weeks, including those requiring hospitalization.
- Assure adequate supplies of N95 respirators (see below for more information).
- Actively review facility pandemic readiness.

COVID-19 Clinical Presentation

Clinical presentation among reported cases of COVID-19 varies in severity from mild to severe illness. Currently it is believed that many people with COVID-19 have mild, self-limited disease. Risk factors for severe illness are still being evaluated, although older patients and those with chronic medical conditions appear to be at higher risk for severe illness. Information on the clinical presentation of COVID-19 can be found in the <u>CDC's Interim Clinical Guidance for Management of Patients with Confirmed Coronavirus Disease 2019.</u>

Assure Adequate Supplies of N95 Respirators

Increased demands for N95 respirators and limited supplies could result in shortages in health care settings.

LAC DPH Guidance for Optimizing Limited Supplies of N95 Respirators provides guidance to allow for the use of N95 respirators beyond their manufacturer-designated shelf life and the limited reuse and extended use of N95 respirators to help with increased demands and decreased supplies. If this strategy is used, it is important to prepare as it requires specialized planning, training and education to ensure healthcare worker and patient safety.

In the setting of a respirator or mask shortage, healthcare facilities can apply for additional supplies through the mechanisms below. Please note that unless your facility will entirely deplete its current supply, you should defer requests until March 11, 2020 when more supplies will be available through local and state caches.

- Facilities that are part of the Reddinet should send requests through that system.
- Healthcare facilities and clinics not part of Reddinet can complete the request form <u>Resource Request Medical and Health (2018)</u> and email it to <u>LAEMSADutyOfficer@dhs.lacounty.gov</u>.

Patients not meeting COVID-19 evaluation criteria do not need to be reported.

Individuals experiencing chronic homelessness have an increased likelihood of chronic medical conditions (such as diabetes, asthma, and hypertension) as well as coinciding mental health diagnosis and/or history of substance use.

During crisis situations, health conditions can be exacerbated if health care regimes are not maintained or histories of trauma trigger high-risk behaviors. These factors may increase individuals' risk of infection and should be accounted for in response planning. Local partners also need to consider how congregate programs (i.e. nursing homes and homeless shelters) can limit risks to their clients, staff, and volunteers. In the meantime, shelter providers should consult with their local health department before turning away individuals with respiratory symptoms. If an individual requires medical attention, please continue to direct them to a healthcare provider.

POLICY:

Pursuant to the Emergency Proclamation of the 4th day of March 2020 by Governor Gavin

Newsom, the following procedure shall be followed to implement subsection 13 of the Order concerning the preparation and response to the COVID-19 outbreak.

"13. Notwithstanding Health and Safety Code sections 1797.52 and 1797.218, during the course of this emergency, any EMT-P licensees shall have the authority to transport patients to medical facilities other than acute care hospitals when approved by the California EMS Authority. In order to carry out this order, to the extent that the provisions of Health and Safety Code sections 1797.52 and 1797.218 may prohibit EMT-P licensees from transport patients to facilities other than acute care hospitals, those statutes are hereby suspended until the termination of this State of Emergency".

A local EMS agency which desires to utilize paramedics (EMT-P) to transport patient(s) to a medical facility, other than a general acute care hospital, in preparing for and responding to the COVID-19 State of Emergency shall submit a written request to the EMS Authority in advance.

PROCEDURE:

A local EMS agency which desires to utilize paramedics (EMT-P) to transport patient(s) to a medical facility other than a general acute care hospital (non-permitted medical facility), in preparing for and responding to the COVID-19 State of Emergency shall submit a written request to the EMS Authority in advance.

(A) The written request may be made electronically to expedite the review process. No specific application form is required.

Please submit your request directly to Sean Trask, Chief of EMS Personnel Division, with a copy to Dr. Duncan, Director, and the Jennifer Lim, acting Chief Deputy Director. Mr. Trask will acknowledge your submissions and distribute them to his staff accordingly for review.

(B) The request shall contain the following minimum components, as informed by Health and Safety Code §1798.101(b):

(1) Identification of each non-permitted medical facility proposed to be used as an alternate destination.

(2) Policy and/or protocols approved by the medical director of the local EMS agency to ensure that the use of each facility is in the best interests of patient care. The policy and/or protocols addressing patient safety and the use of the non-permitted medical facility shall take into account, but not be limited to, the following:

- The level of medical staff, and the availability of the staff at various times to care for patients requiring services at the alternate destination.
- The ability of staff to care for the degree and severity of the patients' conditions.
- The availability of more comprehensive emergency medical services and the distance and travel time necessary to make the alternative emergency medical services available if the non-permitted medical facility is unable to care for the patient.

- The equipment and services that are available at the facility necessary to care for patients requiring COVID-19 services or emergency medical services and the severity of their condition.
- The hours of operation, and any limitations of the non-permitted medical facility, which may negatively impact the treatment of patients requiring COVID-19 services or other emergency medical services.
- Policy and/or protocols for determining the appropriate use of alternate destination(s).
- Training for EMS personnel on all protocols for determining transport to an alternate destination including PPE, COVID-19 signs and symptoms, alternate destination availability and capabilities, and data collection methods.
- Policies for data collection to include, but not limited to, transport to the alternate destinations, reasons for transport(s), any secondary transports of these patients, and outcome when available.

(C) The request shall have the concurrence of both the EMS Agency Medical Director and the County Health Officer.

(D) The California EMS Authority shall review and make a written determination within two (2) business days after receipt of a complete request to utilize a non-permitted medical facility.

(E) The duration of the approval shall continue until the termination of the State of Emergency.



Individuals experiencing chronic homelessness have an increased likelihood of chronic medical conditions (such as diabetes, asthma, and hypertension) as well as coinciding mental health diagnosis and/or history of substance use.

During crisis situations, health conditions can be exacerbated if health care regimes are not maintained or histories of trauma trigger high-risk behaviors. These factors may increase individuals' risk of infection and should be accounted for in response planning. Local partners also need to consider how congregate programs (i.e. nursing homes and homeless shelters) can limit risks to their clients, staff, and volunteers. In the meantime, shelter providers should consult with their local health department before turning away individuals with respiratory symptoms. If an individual requires medical attention, please continue to direct them to a healthcare provider.

How Can People Protect Themselves:

Every person has a role to play. So much of protecting yourself and your family comes down to common sense:

- Washing hands with soap and water.
- Avoiding touching eyes, nose or mouth with unwashed hands.
- Avoiding close contact with people who are sick.
- Staying away from work, school or other people if you become sick with respiratory symptoms like fever and cough.
- Following guidance from public health officials.

What to Do if You Think You're Sick:

• Call ahead: If you are experiencing symptoms of COVID-19 and may have had contact with a person with COVID-19 or recently traveled to countries with apparent community spread, call your health care provider or local public health department first before seeking medical care so that appropriate precautions can be taken.

California's Response to COVID-19:

We have been actively and extensively planning with our local public health and health care delivery systems. Here are some of the things we are already doing:

- As in any public health event, the California Department of Public Health's Medical and Health Coordination Center has been activated and is coordinating public health response efforts across the state.
- California continues to prepare and respond in coordination with federal and local partners, hospitals and physicians.
- Governor Newsom declared a State of Emergency to make additional resources available, formalize emergency actions already underway across multiple state agencies and departments, and help the state prepare for broader spread of COVID-19.
- Governor Gavin Newsom requested the Legislature make up to \$20 million available for state government to respond to the spread of COVID-19.
- California activated the State Operations Center to its highest level to coordinate response efforts across the state.
- 24 million more Californians are now eligible for free medically necessary COVID-19 testing.
- California made available some of its emergency planning reserves of 21 million N95 filtering facepiece masks for use in certain health care settings to ease shortages of personal protective equipment.
- The Public Health Department is providing information, guidance documents, and technical support to local health departments, health care facilities, providers, schools, universities, colleges, and childcare facilities across California.
- The Public Health Department is coordinating with federal authorities and local health departments that have implemented screening, monitoring and, in some cases quarantine of returning travelers.
- In coordination with the CDC, state and local health departments, we are actively responding to cases of COVID-19.
- The Public Health Department is supporting hospitals and local public health laboratories in the collection of specimens and testing for COVID-19.

• The California Department of Public Health's state laboratory in Richmond and 14 other public health department laboratories now have tests for the virus that causes COVID-19.

With two confirmed cases that indicate community spread, the time is now to take action to protect vulnerable populations and the public at large.

Recommendations for social distancing will disrupt the virus's path from person to person.

San Francisco, CA — Mayor London N. Breed, the San Francisco Department of Public Health and the Department of Emergency Management today announced aggressive new recommendations for San Francisco to reduce the spread of coronavirus (COVID-19) in the community. Dr. Grant Colfax will be available to speak with press at 5:00 p.m. at the Department of Public Health, 101 Grove Street, Room 220.

The City is taking swift action upon the confirmation yesterday of two COVID-19 cases among San Francisco residents that indicated community spread of the virus. Today's recommendations for social distancing are intended to disrupt the spread of the virus and protect community health. These are systemic as well as individual changes that will make a difference in people's lives. Although the recommendations will cause inconvenience, they are necessary and worthwhile to reduce the spread of the virus and interrupt its transmission from person to person.

"We have been preparing for this," said Mayor Breed. "These recommendations are informed by the best public health information available and guided by experts in our own health department. They mirror the actions being taken in many other municipalities and are informed by the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention guidelines. These are important steps to protect our public health and are concrete things all of us can do to keep our community safe."

"Keeping the public safe and healthy is our most important responsibility," said Board of Supervisors President Norman Yee. "We must continue protect our seniors and other members of our vulnerable communities who are most at risk of being seriously harmed by this disease. Each of us must do our part to support and follow these recommendations so we can help mitigate the spread of COVID-19."

"As a public official who has been through a number of public health emergencies in the past, I am fully supportive of the Mayor and public health officials in taking the necessary precautions to reduce transmissions of COVID-19," said Supervisor Aaron Peskin. "While many may be concerned about the immediate impacts this may have on our local economy and our daily lives, taking these bold precautions now will pay off in the long term."

City agencies including the Municipal Transportation Agency, Department of Human Resources, Office of Economic and Workforce Development, Human Services Agency and our partners at the San Francisco Unified School District are planning to start implementing these recommendations immediately.

We expect these measures to be in place for an **initial period of two weeks**, and we will continuously assess their impact to determine if they need to be adjusted. As the City prioritizes public health, we also acknowledge this will have economic and workforce impacts, particularly for smaller businesses, and the City will continue to work with state and federal partners to identify solutions to address those impacts.

Mayor Breed declared a local emergency on February 25th to boost San Francisco's preparedness efforts. Steps taken since then include expanding the Emergency Operations Center and activating dozens of city Disaster Service Workers, increasing community outreach and public information, expanding outreach to vulnerable populations and the organizations that care for them, and starting testing for COVID-19 at the San Francisco Department of Public Health lab. It was that lab that confirmed the first two positive cases with a one-day turnaround time, a vast improvement from the reporting time from the CDC lab. This allowed us to take action more rapidly to protect public health. Today's recommendations for social distancing have a goal of reducing the occasions when large numbers of people come together and potentially are exposed to the virus that is circulating in our community. The recommendations protect the health of vulnerable populations, and ensure that essential public services, such as schools and transportation, are taking steps to protect the public.

"The virus needs people to spread. It jumps from person to person, so by reducing the opportunity for that to happen, we can effectively slow the spread," said Dr. Grant Colfax, Director of Health. "Our chief concern is for vulnerable populations who are most at risk of getting very sick, or dying, if they get COVID-19. That is why we are recommending that people over 60, or with certain underlying health conditions, stay home as much as possible. For the general public, reducing the opportunity for exposure to the virus is the top priority. That means cutting back on the time you spend in groups and washing your hands consistently. Together, San Franciscans can unite in this effort and decrease the impact COVID-19 has on our community."

"Protecting the health and safety of San Franciscans is our most important responsibility, and cancelling large gatherings will reduce the spread of COVID-19 and protect the most vulnerable in our community. Seniors and people with chronic illness and underlying medical conditions are protected when normally healthy people are not contributing to the spread of the virus," said Mary Ellen Carroll, Executive Director, San Francisco Department of Emergency Management.

Today's recommendations will cause changes in behavior for systems and individuals. They are meant to disrupt normal social behavior, because the virus thrives under normal circumstances. Functions that are essential to an individual or their family, such as getting food, traveling to work, or providing for a sick family member, can be continued. This is an evolving situation and these recommendations are expected to change.

PUBLIC HEALTH RECOMMENDATIONS AS OF MARCH 6

1) Vulnerable Populations: Limit Outings

- Vulnerable populations include people who are:
 - o 60 years old and older.
 - People with certain health conditions such as heart disease, lung disease, diabetes, kidney disease and weakened immune systems.
- For vulnerable populations, don't go to gatherings (of about 50 people or more) unless it is essential. If you can telecommute, you should. Avoid people who are sick.

2) Workplace and Businesses: Minimize Exposure

- Suspend nonessential employee travel.
- Minimize the number of employees working within arm's length of one another, including minimizing or canceling large in-person meetings and conferences.
- Urge employees to stay home when they are sick and maximize flexibility in sick leave benefits.
- Do not require a doctor's note for employees who are sick.

- Consider use of telecommuting options.
- Some people need to be at work to provide essential services of great benefit to the community. They can take steps in their workplace to minimize risk.

3) Large Gatherings: Cancel Non-essential Events

- Recommend cancelling or postponing large gatherings, such as concerts, sporting events, conventions or large community events.
- Do not attend any events or gatherings if sick.
- For events that aren't cancelled, we recommend:
 - Having hand washing capabilities, hand sanitizers and tissues available.
 - Frequently cleaning high touch surface areas like counter tops and hand rails.
 - Finding ways to create physical space to minimize close contact as much as possible.

4) Schools: Safety First

- If there is a confirmed case of COVID-19 at a school, DPH will work with the school and the district to determine the best measures including potential school closure.
- Do not go to school if sick.
- If you have a child with chronic health conditions, consult your doctor about school attendance.
- Equip all schools and classrooms with hand sanitizers and tissues.
- Recommend rescheduling or cancelling medium to large events that are not essential.
- Explore remote teaching and online options to continue learning.
- Schools should develop a plan for citywide school closures, and families should prepare for potential closures.

5) **Transit: Cleaning and Protection**

- Increase cleaning of vehicles and high touch surface areas.
- Provide hand washing/hand sanitizers and tissues in stations and on vehicles.

6) Health Care Settings: Avoid as possible, protect the vulnerable

- Long term care facilities must have a COVID-19 plan in accordance with DPH guidelines.
- Long term care facilities must screen all staff and visitors for illness and turn away those with symptoms.
- The general public should avoid going to medical settings such as hospitals, nursing homes and long-term care facilities, even if you are not ill.
- If you are ill, call your health care provider ahead of time, and you may be able to be served by phone.
- Do not visit emergency rooms unless it is essential.

7) **Everyone: Do your part**

The best way for all San Franciscans to reduce their risk of getting sick, as with seasonal colds or the flu, still applies to prevent COVID-19:

- Wash hands with soap and water for at least 20 seconds.
- Cover your cough or sneeze.
- Stay home if you are sick.

- Avoid touching your face.
- Try alternatives to shaking hands, like an elbow bump or wave.
- If you have recently returned from a country, state or region with ongoing COVID-19 infections, monitor your health and follow the instructions of public health officials.
- There is no recommendation to wear masks at this time to prevent yourself from getting sick.

You can also prepare for the possible disruption caused by an outbreak. Preparedness actions include:

- Prepare to work from home if that is possible for your job, and your employer.
- Make sure you have a supply of all essential medications for your family.
- Prepare a child care plan if you or a care giver are sick.
- Make arrangements about how your family will manage a school closure.
- Plan for how you can care for a sick family member without getting sick yourself.
- Take care of each other and check in by phone with friends, family and neighbors that are vulnerable to serious illness or death if they get COVID-19.
- Keep common spaces clean to help maintain a healthy environment for you and others. Frequently touched surfaces should be cleaned regularly with disinfecting sprays, wipes or common household cleaning products.

Roberta,

I made an inquiry over the weekend with CHA policy and legal staff. Here's a summary of the responses:

- If the governor declares a state of emergency due to COVID-19, he may (or may not) waive ratio requirements.
- Title 22 (ratio regulation section) has a provision in case of surge:
 - "The hospital shall plan for routine fluctuations in patient census. If a healthcare emergency causes a change in the number of patients on a unit, the hospital must demonstrate that prompt efforts were made to maintain required staffing levels. A healthcare emergency is defined for this purpose as an unpredictable or unavoidable occurrence at unscheduled or unpredictable intervals relating to healthcare delivery requiring immediate medical interventions and care."
- CDPH cannot issue a penalty for ration violation "if the hospital demonstrates to the satisfaction of the department all of the following:
 - That any fluctuation in required staffing levels was unpredictable and uncontrollable.
 - Prompt efforts were made to maintain required staffing levels.
 - In making those efforts, the hospital immediately used and subsequently exhausted the hospital's on-call list of nurses and the charge nurse."
- There is no requirement to report an inability to meet ratios to CDPH. However, if there's a huge and/or prolonged surge, the hospital should alert its CDPH district office under the

"unusual occurrence" reporting requirement.

• CHA recommends that we review our staffing policies and document mitigation measures, etc.

Please let me know if you or your staff would like to connect with CHA staff to discuss further.

I'm hoping I don't need to worry about this but as we think about surge planning I wondered whether there was any discussion about having the California Attorney General suspend some of the rules around title 22 in the event cases of COVID-19 overwhelm our ability to find staff.

While Title 22 mandates nurse to patient staffing ratios that for some areas and circumstances are higher than you see in other parts of the country, I the event of a true public health emergency hospitals would need relief from this regulatory requirements. Ideally we would like to use judgment whether a slightly different staffing might be possible, especially for low acuity patients awaiting nursing home placement and some others.

Keep me posted.

Dear neighbors, I thought I would share the following to provide some practical information from my perspective: please excuse typos as I'm dictating this long post.

An Emergency Physician's Guide to Novel Coronavirus in the US and Infection Control 101:

So, let's start with science. There are many, many coronaviruses that generally infect animals and occasionally humans. The taxonomically correct name of the viral strain currently circulating worldwide is SARS- CoV-2, As the virus closely resembles SARS. When you get infected with this virus, you have COVID-19, so named because the strain emerged in 2019. These names are chosen carefully to avoid stigma or association with a geographic region, as it is increasingly clear this will become a worldwide issue in the coming months. For many years, virologists have predicted that a virus like this would emerge at some point, it was only a matter of time. And here we are. It is not a Chinese bioterror weapon that was accidentally or purposely released, bioterrorism weapons are far more lethal. It is not a democratic hoax. It is very real.

However, it is also not a reason to panic. Although most of us will contract SARS-CoV-2, is not terribly lethal. The vast majority of people will get a cold like illness. Kids seem to get symptoms in large numbers, but very very few get very sick. The group of people that seem to get quite sick from this disease are people over the age of 60, and illness severity goes up as age increases.

If you are a senior, it is wise to take precautions and measures to avoid contact with large groups of people over the next few months as this virus circulates. Now is NOT the time to go to the gym, movies, concerts, lectures or large family reunions. Consider delaying travel plans if any. I know it's not ecologically friendly, but getting as much delivered to your home as possible if you are >65 yo. Groceries drugstore items etc. Build up your immune system with fresh fruit veggies antioxidants and other immune boosters. Cut back on or stop drinking alcohol. Stop smoking. Yes, stop smoking marijuana too. Get some fresh air, but in your backyard, away from other people. Wash your hands. A lot. This is the best way to prevent spread and decrease your own viral load. Surgical masks unfortunately are not a magic shield. They help decrease the amount of times you touch your face and mouth, which can help prevent the virus from entering into your body, but the virus particles are small enough to pass through this barrier. Surgical masks are not a bad idea to wear if you are one of those people who when they do get sick, feel the need to spew their cough everywhere, instead of coughing into your elbow, Dracula style. They help to reduce droplet transmission to other people around you when you cough or sneeze, but they won't protect you much from the virus. The main thing that will prevent transmission is washing your hands and not touching your mouth nose and face. Let me say that again. Washing your hands and not touching your nose and mouth are the most effective ways to prevent getting this virus.

Please save the N95 masks for those of us who work at hospitals, who will be exposed to this virus again and again and again in the coming months. N95's may afford some protection to decrease viral spread, but are far from a magic shield. They only filter down to 5 μ m. This virus is about 1 μ m.

If you are under the age of 60, it is your job to protect seniors. The best way to do that is to prevent transmission and spread. None of our bodies have ever seen this virus before, so none of us have any immunity. Generally when cold viruses move through any given community, there are some people who have immunity to them from having seen something similar to that strain before. This is not the case with SARS-CoV-2. If you get a sore throat headache and fever in the coming months, congratulations. You probably have COVID 19. Post about it on social media, elicit sympathy from your friends, but sharing is not caring. Do not go out in public unless you absolutely have to. Stay away from public transport. Work remotely from home if possible. Wipe down doorknobs and handles and surfaces in your home with bleach or alcohol solutions or wipes. Cover your cough, wash your hands multiple times per day, use hand sanitizer if you are out and about. But you shouldn't be out and about. Keep your kids home from school if they become sick. Children are perfect little vectors, and smear virus everywhere. As I'm sure you know from colds, kids are sick for about 2 seconds, and then all the adults are sick for a week. Anticipate school closures. This is not to protect children, but rather to reduce their spread to others. Along that vein, if you do get sick it may last for a while. Like a few weeks. Stock up now on acetaminophen, ibuprofen teas soups, Hippie elixirs, whatever you use to make yourself feel better when you are ill. You don't want to be going out to shop for these items when you are already sick.

And finally, if you are under the age of 60 and get symptoms, we really do not want to see you at the hospital. Really. If you are over 60 and feel very ill, call your doctor for advice. If you have a fever and cold like illness, you probably have this virus. We will not test you if you are low risk. If need something like intubation to support your breathing, come in. Short of that, stay at home. Millions and millions of people in the US will eventually turn COVID 19 positive. You know what? Unless you are really really sick, there is no reason to prove that it is a COVID 19 versus the flu or a cold. We have no effective treatment for any of those things. You don't need to come see us. I know it's hard to hear, but you will not be unique in your situation. This is bigger than any of us.

I will of course do everything I can to prevent transmitting my virus to you when you encounter me in the emergency department. Ok, I'm not shaving my head, but I'll be doing lots to decontaminate myself and the things I touch regularly. Despite taking these precautions, if you see me in the ED in the coming weeks to months, there is almost a 100% chance that I will be carrying this virus, simply by the fact that I will be encountering multiple people with this virus every day.

If you think you are seriously ill, for example breathing has become a severe struggle, Please call 911 or us before you come in. Hospitals are going to try their best to prevent spread in the hospital, but SARS-Cov-2 is crazy contagious. We may want to bring you in a separate entrance or into a tent or other area so you don't spread the virus to patients in the hospital that are elderly or have little to no immune systems from disease, cancer, etc.

Questions or concerns? The CDC has some great resources. Check it out at CDC.gov. You can also direct message me. I might not get right back to you as I anticipate I anticipate being very very busy with patients in the coming months, but I will do my best to get back to you. We are all in this together. Let's all pull together and be patient and take care of ourselves and each other in the coming weeks and months.

Dear Valued Community Member,

I wanted you to be aware that St. Joseph Health – Humboldt County is being supported by the robust infrastructure for response to the novel coronavirus (COVID-19) developed through Providence St. Joseph Health, as well as through our local expertise and collaboration with local Public Health officials. The PSJH efforts include a virtual command center, daily leadership calls, work groups and a communication plan. We are fortunate to have strong leaders who are working effectively together to serve the needs of our ministries, big and small across 7 states. As part of this effort they have developed the Providence COVID-19 resource website , a resource site for our patients and visitors: https://www.providence.org/patients-and-visitors/coronavirus-advisory .

I've also provided some information that goes out to our caregivers daily below:

Coronavirus disease 2019 (COVID-19) continues to spread globally, currently affecting more than 100 people in the U.S. Like most health systems, our hospitals and clinics are seeing potential and confirmed cases across our seven states. We have protocols in place to treat and control virus outbreaks and the spread of infectious disease, and have been preparing for weeks in anticipation of COVID-19 reaching and growing in our communities. The following is a summary of our current state and our collective efforts to address COVID-19.

How we are responding

- Emergency Operations Center. A virtual Emergency Operations Center composed of leaders from across our organization has been formed to support preparation and response to COVID-19 across our system.
- Home care monitoring program. We are working on a workflow in the Emergency Department that will help determine when to send a patient home versus when to admit them into the ED while ensuring they are safe and monitored.
- Virtual chatbot symptom checker. In partnership with Microsoft, we are working on a virtual chatbot – conversational artificial intelligence – to walk people through their symptoms online and provide resources and recommendations based on their response. This will help people self-screen, which in turn will address volumes coming to our Emergency Departments. The chatbot is expected to go live later this week.
- New screening criteria. We've updated our patient screening tool in our electronic health record with new countries the CDC identifies as high risk. The tool is used in our inpatient and outpatient settings to help identify

patients at risk. This tool will be updated per CDC guidance as travel becomes less of an identifying factor.

- **Testing.** COVID-19 testing has been limited to state and federal public health authorities, resulting in a backlog of results. Recently, we began work on two initiatives to expedite testing within our facilities to more quickly identify, treat and contain the spread of virus in our communities.
 - 1. Creating our own test using one of our Oregon labs.
 - 2. Leveraging Adaptive Biotechnologies, a clinical products company, to create a test.

How to take care of yourself and your family

Be prepared and stock up on necessary supplies in case you need to quarantine yourself at home. Supplies should last two to three weeks. Some things to consider:

- Nonperishable food (canned foods, grains, snacks)
- Drinks (water, hydrating drinks like Gatorade or Pedialyte)
- Medicine (prescription medications you take, over-thecounter pain relievers you would use to treat cold and flu symptoms)

- Yes, that person was released from isolation on March 2.
- 11. Are things a lot worse? Why is the county declaring a Local Health Emergency?
 - The declaration does not reflect any dramatic change in the health of our community. It is being taken to ensure we have the capacity to address the community transmission phase of COVID-19.
 - It is important to declare a Local Health Emergency because it opens up resources local governments can access to assist with in-the-moment needs, like staffing and equipment resources, as well as recouping associated costs once the emergency is resolved.
 - Declaring a Local Health Emergency frees up additional resources locally and throughout the state to slow the spread of the virus.

We want to alert you to the release of CDC's updated Interim U.S. Guidance for Risk Assessment and Public Health Management of Healthcare Personnel with Potential Exposure in a Healthcare Setting to Patients with Coronavirus Disease (COVID-19) now available here: https://www.cdc.gov/coronavirus/2019-ncov/hcp/guidance-risk-assesment-hcp.html

There are several changes we want to highlight in the new guidance compared to the old guidance:

- 1. In regards to conducting risk assessments for healthcare personnel (HCP) for areas with community transmission: For areas within the U.S. that are demonstrating community transmission, all healthcare personnel (HCP) are considered at some risk for COVID-19 whether through patient interactions or from general community interactions. In these instances, devoting resources to contact tracing and retrospective risk assessment could divert resources from other important infection prevention and control activities. Instead, facilities may decide to shift their emphasis to more routine practices, which includes asking HCP to report recognized exposures, regularly monitor themselves for fever and symptoms of respiratory infection and not reporting to work when ill. Facilities should develop a plan for how they will screen for symptoms and evaluate ill HCP.
- 2. In regards to HCP furlough: The old guidance recommended work restrictions for HCP with medium or high risk exposure. In the new guidance, facilities could consider allowing asymptomatic HCP who have had an exposure to a COVID-19 patient to continue to work after consultation with their occupational health program. These HCP should still report temperature and absence of symptoms each day prior to starting work. Facilities could have exposed HCP wear a facemask while at work for the 14 days after the exposure event if there is a sufficient supply of facemasks. If HCP develop even mild symptoms consistent with COVID-19, they must cease patient care activities, don a facemask (if not already wearing), and notify their supervisor or occupational health services prior to leaving work.

3. If a risk assessment is pursued for exposed HCP:

a. Table 1. Epidemiologic Risk Classification for Asymptomatic Healthcare Personnel Following Exposure to Patients with Coronavirus Disease (COVID-19) or their Secretions/Excretions in a Healthcare Setting, and their Associated Monitoring and Work Restriction Recommendations has been simplified with a focus on presence/absence of source control measures; use of personal protective equipment (PPE) by HCP; and degree of contact with the patient (i.e., prolonged versus brief).

- b. In addition, for those who are assessed as requiring "self-monitoring with delegated supervision" the requirement to actively verify absence of fever and respiratory symptoms when healthcare personnel (HCP) report for work is now optional.
- c. The category of HCP who fully adhered to recommended PPE was removed from Table 1. but is still addressed under section III, #3. These HCP should still perform self-monitoring with delegated supervision as described under the low-risk exposure category.

Hey Sean – It was good catching up with you earlier today.

Here's a quick rundown of the relevant coronavirus provisions of the emergency

supplemental spending bill (HR 6074). By the way, the Senate cleared the legislation this afternoon, so it's on its way to the president's desk.

The bill provides \$2.2 billion via the CDC to support federal, state, and local public health agencies to prevent, prepare for, and respond to the coronavirus, of which:

- \$950 million is for "grants to or cooperative agreements with" states, local governments, territories, and tribes to conduct public health activities, including:
 - surveillance for coronavirus;
 - laboratory testing to detect positive cases;
 - contact tracing to identify additional positive cases;
 - infection control at the local level to prevent additional cases;
 - migration in areas with person-to-person transmission to prevent additional cases; and,
 - other public health preparedness and response activities

The bill stipulates that \$475 million (of the aforementioned \$950 M) must be allocated within 30 days. HHS will be putting together guidance in short order and implementing the provisions of the bill.

Furthermore, the supplemental includes language specifying reimbursement for State/local costs incurred for coronavirus preparedness and response activities between January 20 and the date of the bill's enactment. Per our discussion, it sounds as if the County may have incurred some costs, to date.

Good morning,

I was contacted by CalOES with some information relating to recovery/reimbursement surrounding COVID-19. – Please forward this information to the Finance Section Chief so tracking can begin.

As everyone is aware, the Governor proclaimed a State of Emergency (SOE) on Wednesday, to "make additional resources available, formalize emergency actions already underway across multiple state agencies and departments, and help the state prepare for a broader spread of COVID-19". Oftentimes, the Governor's Office will include CDAA language in an SOE; however, the inclusion of the CDAA language within the SOE does not automatically authorize CDAA funding for the local jurisdictions, rather, it is included to reduce the amount of associated red tape.

Although included in the SOES, the CDAA paragraph also includes the words "if appropriate and necessary" (included in every SOE that has CDAA language). <u>This means that every</u> jurisdiction has to prove how the event is beyond their capabilities to respond and to recover from the incident. As such, the information we should look to capture is as follows (this is not an all-inclusive list):

- OT hours of force account labor responding to the event
- Emergency Operations Center costs
- Regular and OT hours for contract work during the emergency response (i.e., debris removal, contract cleaners, etc.)
- Debris removal activities and amounts on local and federal roadways (likely not applicable to this incident)
- Damage estimates of infrastructure damages already repaired and still needing repair
- Sheriff/Police patrol costs
- Mutual aid costs

** it is important to note that costs should not be captured for things that might happen, or damage not related to the incident

Only private nonprofits (PNP) providing the following types of government-like services to the general public should be included in a initial damage estimate (IDE):

- Educational facilities
- Utilities
- Emergency or medical facilities
- Custodial care facilities
- Museums
- Zoos
- Community centers
- Libraries
- Homeless shelters
- Senior citizen centers

All other PNPs should be treated as businesses for the purpose of damage assessment, and included on Individual Assistance damage assessment forms.

At present time it is unknown what types of things may be funded, from which state agency, or under what program. Therefore, it is best that we continue to capture costs in the same way that we would during a "normal" EOC activation.

I hope this is helpful, please reach out to me with any questions.

Here is a pass at what a morning report might look like. Note the last item from Del Norte County where they are already doing what Jeremy mentioned yesterday providing the numbers the state is asking us to track around confirmed cases and numbers quarantined. They don't have test info, obvs, but seemingly everything else. Aside from that information, I focused on articles with changes in or clarification of guidance. Obviously we would have them to you earlier in the day.

Below that is new guidance from the CDC. I talked to CDC PIO staff today, and they do not currently have a system for tracking changes to guidance. They had clearly received the question before and acknowledged the problem and the gap. I had Christine call and get a different PIO, and that person elevated the request to a higher level. We'll see if anything comes of it. For now, I don't know who has the MENSA-like ability to detect minute changes in sheaves of documents each morning. Not me, and not really anyone I know. It's a ridiculous request, and I wonder if we might have to deal with it by assuming major changes in guidance will be tagged and flagged so that no one misses them and that little stuff is just that—little. Not sure what else to recommend.

Except for the things we can't get, is this kind of what you're looking for? Do you have a proposed recipient list?

Dear neighbors, I thought I would share the following to provide some practical information from my perspective: please excuse typos as I'm dictating this long post.

An Emergency Physician's Guide to Novel Coronavirus in the US and Infection Control 101:

So, let's start with science. There are many, many coronaviruses that generally infect animals and occasionally humans. The taxonomically correct name of the viral strain currently circulating worldwide is SARS- CoV-2, As the virus closely resembles SARS. When you get infected with this virus, you have COVID-19, so named because the strain emerged in 2019. These names are chosen carefully to avoid stigma or association with a geographic region, as it is increasingly clear this will become a worldwide issue in the coming months. For many years, virologists have predicted that a virus like this would emerge at some point, it was only a matter of time. And here we are. It is not a Chinese bioterror weapon that was accidentally or purposely released, bioterrorism weapons are far more lethal. It is not a democratic hoax. It is very real. However, it is also not a reason to panic. Although most of us will contract SARS-CoV-2, is not terribly lethal. The vast majority of people will get a cold like illness. Kids seem to get symptoms in large numbers, but very very few get very sick. The group of people that seem to get quite sick from this disease are people over the age of 60, and illness severity goes up as age increases.

If you are a senior, it is wise to take precautions and measures to avoid contact with large groups of people over the next few months as this virus circulates. Now is NOT the time to go to the gym, movies, concerts, lectures or large family reunions. Consider delaying travel plans if any. I know it's not ecologically friendly, but getting as much delivered to your home as possible if you are >65 yo. Groceries drugstore items etc. Build up your immune system with fresh fruit veggies antioxidants and other immune boosters. Cut back on or stop drinking alcohol. Stop smoking. Yes, stop smoking marijuana too. Get some fresh air, but in your backyard, away from other people. Wash your hands. A lot. This is the best way to prevent spread and decrease your own viral load. Surgical masks unfortunately are not a magic shield. They help decrease the amount of times you touch your face and mouth, which can help prevent the virus from entering into your body, but the virus particles are small enough to pass through this barrier. Surgical masks are not a bad idea to wear if you are one of those people who when they do get sick, feel the need to spew their cough everywhere, instead of coughing into your elbow, Dracula style. They help to reduce droplet transmission to other people around you when you cough or sneeze, but they won't protect you much from the virus. The main thing that will prevent transmission is washing your hands and not touching your mouth nose and face. Let me say that again. Washing your hands and not touching your nose and mouth are the most effective ways to prevent getting this virus.

Please save the N95 masks for those of us who work at hospitals, who will be exposed to this virus again and again and again in the coming months. N95's may afford some protection to decrease viral spread, but are far from a magic shield. They only filter down to 5 μ m. This virus is about 1 μ m.

If you are under the age of 60, it is your job to protect seniors. The best way to do that is to prevent transmission and spread. None of our bodies have ever seen this virus before, so none of us have any immunity. Generally when cold viruses move through any given community, there are some people who have immunity to them from having seen something similar to that strain before. This is not the case with SARS-CoV-2. If you get a sore throat headache and fever in the coming months, congratulations. You probably have COVID 19. Post about it on social media, elicit sympathy from your friends, but sharing is not caring. Do not go out in public unless you absolutely have to. Stay away from public transport. Work remotely from home if possible. Wipe down doorknobs and handles and surfaces in your home with bleach or alcohol solutions or wipes. Cover your cough, wash your hands multiple times per day, use hand sanitizer if you are out and about. But you shouldn't be out and about. Keep your kids home from school if they become sick. Children are perfect little vectors, and smear virus everywhere. As I'm sure you know from colds, kids are sick for about 2 seconds, and then all the adults are sick for a week. Anticipate school closures. This is not to protect children, but rather to reduce their spread to others. Along that vein, if you do get sick it may last for a while. Like a few weeks. Stock up now on acetaminophen, ibuprofen teas soups, Hippie elixirs, whatever you use to make yourself feel better when you are ill. You don't want to be going out to shop for these items when you are already sick.

And finally, if you are under the age of 60 and get symptoms, we really do not want to see you at the hospital. Really. If you are over 60 and feel very ill, call your doctor for advice. If you have a fever and cold like illness, you probably have this virus. We will not test you if you are low risk. If need something like intubation to support your breathing, come in. Short of that, stay at home. Millions and millions of people in the US will eventually turn COVID 19 positive. You know what? Unless you are really really sick, there is no reason to prove that it is a COVID 19 versus the flu or a cold. We have no effective treatment for any of those things. You don't need to come see us. I know it's hard to hear, but you will not be unique in your situation. This is bigger than any of us.

I will of course do everything I can to prevent transmitting my virus to you when you encounter me in the emergency department. Ok, I'm not shaving my head, but I'll be doing lots to decontaminate myself and the things I touch regularly. Despite taking these precautions, if you see me in the ED in the coming weeks to months, there is almost a 100% chance that I will be carrying this virus, simply by the fact that I will be encountering multiple people with this virus every day.

If you think you are seriously ill, for example breathing has become a severe struggle, Please call 911 or us before you come in. Hospitals are going to try their best to prevent spread in the hospital, but SARS-Cov-2 is crazy contagious. We may want to bring you in a separate entrance or into a tent or other area so you don't spread the virus to patients in the hospital that are elderly or have little to no immune systems from disease, cancer, etc.

Questions or concerns? The CDC has some great resources. Check it out at CDC.gov. You can also direct message me. I might not get right back to you as I anticipate I anticipate being very very busy with patients in the coming months, but I will do my best to get back to you. We are all in this together. Let's all pull together and be patient and take care of ourselves and each other in the coming weeks and months.

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LAC DPH Health Advisory: COVID-19 Guidance--Optimizing N95 Supplies and Managing Mild Illness March 4, 2020

This message is intended for all health care providers practicing in Los Angeles County. Please distribute as appropriate.

There is a very limited supply of SARS-CoV-2 testing available to Los Angeles County at this time. Until testing is more widely available, testing must be reserved for patients with severe illness and

the close contacts of confirmed cases of coronavirus disease 2019 (COVID-19).

Key Messages

- The Los Angeles County Department of Public Health (LAC DPH) is authorizing the adoption of the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC) <u>contingency capacity</u> <u>strategies</u> for healthcare facilities experiencing critical shortages of N95 respirators. LAC DPH has created <u>guidance</u> to allow for the use of N95 respirators beyond their manufacturer-designated shelf life and the limited reuse and extended use of N95 respirators to help with increased demands and decreased supplies.
- Healthcare providers should contact LAC DPH to arrange for SARS-CoV-2 testing for any patients that meet the current LAC DPH COVID-19 Evaluation Criteria outlined in the <u>February 29 LAHAN</u> and included below.
- Due to the very limited supply of SARS-CoV-2 testing available to Los Angeles County at this time, testing is being restricted for use in patients with severe illness and those who are known close contacts to confirmed cases. Patients with mild illness who do not meet the current LAC DPH COVID-19 Evaluation Criteria should be instructed to follow home care instructions and do not need to be reported to LAC DPH.
- Healthcare facilities and clinics are strongly encouraged to communicate with patients, staff, and visitors about the importance of staying home when they have mild cold or flu-like symptoms.
- The CDC is hosting a <u>webinar</u> "COVID-19 Update—What Clinicians Need to Know to Prepare for COVID-19 in the United States" on Thursday March 5 at 11 am PST.

Situation

The COVID-19 disease situation is evolving in the United States with more cases being identified and reported each day. LAC DPH has recently confirmed 6 new cases of COVID-19 bringing the total to 7 confirmed cases to date in LA County. All of the new cases have known or likely sources of exposure and none provide direct evidence of community transmission. None of these cases were linked to the first case reported in a non-resident traveler in January.

This notification is to provide health care providers and facilities with information on maintaining supplies of N95 respirators as well as guidance on the current management of patients with mild illness who do not meet the current criteria for SARS-CoV-2 testing.

NOTE: In anticipation of increased diagnostic testing at clinical laboratories, the CDC has removed the criteria for testing and suggested expanding testing to a wider group of symptomatic patients. Please be aware that this is currently not feasible at the local level. In LA County, the only COVID-19 testing is through the LAC DPH Public Health Lab that has limited testing capacity. Public Health is aware that increased testing is needed by the medical community, is seeking to expand local testing capacity, and will provide updated information to health care providers as this becomes available in the future.

Health care providers are advised to check <u>LAC DPH COVID-19 Healthcare Provider website</u> for the most up to date guidance and resources.

Actions Requested of Providers

• Screen patients for any signs or symptoms of febrile respiratory illness. If present, healthcare workers should don surgical masks. The patient should be instructed to wear a surgical mask and be placed in a private room with the door closed or separated from

others by at least 6 feet.

- Assess if the patient meets criteria for testing using the <u>LAC DPH Provider Checklist</u>: Evaluating Patients Who May Have COVID-19. If the patient meets criteria, follow the guidance on additional infection control procedures and contact LAC DPH to approve specimen collection for SARS-CoV-2 testing.
- Manage patients with mild illness at home according to their clinical status. Due to
 the limited availability of SARS-CoV-2 testing at this time, patients with mild presentations
 who do not meet the LAC DPH COVID-19 Evaluation Criteria are not eligible to receive
 SARS-CoV-2 testing and do not need to be reported to DPH. Supportive care is
 recommended. Instruct patients to follow home care instructions including:
 - Stay home for at least 24 hours after the resolution of febrile illness without the use of fever-reducing medicines.
 - Phone their provider if symptoms worsen.

Note: Consider more active monitoring of older adults and those with co-morbid medical conditions as they may be at higher risk of developing severe disease.

Actions Recommended for Health Care Systems and Clinics

- Distribute messaging to patients about <u>staying home when sick</u> with fever or cold or flu symptoms.
- Post signs asking visitors with fever and/or cold and flu symptoms to defer hospital visits.
- Skilled nursing facilities (SNF) should consider stopping in-person visitation of residents. Instead, virtual visitation using alternative modes of contact such as videoconferencing or telephone should be encouraged. Visitation could introduce COVID-19 into vulnerable SNF populations and should be limited as much as possible until the threat of COVID-19 has diminished.
- Remind all staff to stay home and not come to work if sick with symptoms of febrile respiratory illness until they are free of fever for at least 24 hours without the use of fever-reducing medicines. Defer from requiring a doctor's note for return to work, when possible.
- Create systems to reduce the number of people with mild illness that present for care such as through the use of telephone triage, counseling call line, and any other means available.
- Anticipate a potentially large increase in the number of persons presenting for evaluation and clinical care related to COVID-19 in the coming weeks, including those requiring hospitalization.
- Assure adequate supplies of N95 respirators (see below for more information).
- Actively review facility pandemic readiness.

COVID-19 Clinical Presentation

Clinical presentation among reported cases of COVID-19 varies in severity from mild to severe illness. Currently it is believed that many people with COVID-19 have mild, self-limited disease. Risk factors for severe illness are still being evaluated, although older patients and those with chronic medical conditions appear to be at higher risk for severe illness. Information on the clinical presentation of COVID-19 can be found in the <u>CDC's Interim Clinical Guidance for Management of</u> Patients with Confirmed Coronavirus Disease 2019.

Assure Adequate Supplies of N95 Respirators

Increased demands for N95 respirators and limited supplies could result in shortages in health care settings.

LAC DPH Guidance for Optimizing Limited Supplies of N95 Respirators provides guidance to allow for the use of N95 respirators beyond their manufacturer-designated shelf life and the limited reuse and extended use of N95 respirators to help with increased demands and decreased supplies. If this strategy is used, it is important to prepare as it requires specialized planning, training and education to ensure healthcare worker and patient safety.

In the setting of a respirator or mask shortage, healthcare facilities can apply for additional supplies through the mechanisms below. Please note that unless your facility will entirely deplete its current supply, you should defer requests until March 11, 2020 when more supplies will be available through local and state caches.

- Facilities that are part of the Reddinet should send requests through that system.
- Healthcare facilities and clinics not part of Reddinet can complete the request form <u>Resource Request Medical and Health (2018)</u> and email it to <u>LAEMSADutyOfficer@dhs.lacounty.gov</u>.

Reporting

Patients not meeting COVID-19 evaluation criteria do not need to be reported.

 - It is important to declare a Local Health Emergency because it opens up resources local governments can access to assist with in-the-moment needs, like staffing and equipment resources, as well as recouping associated costs once the emergency is resolved.
 - Declaring a Local Health Emergency frees up additional resources locally and throughout the state to slow the spread of the virus.

-Please note that providers requesting testing need to be aware that laboratory testing capacity for COVID-19 is limited. While we think that it is reasonable to route specimens for COVID-19 testing to the SMC PHL in the scenarios outlined below, we are still working to clarify which specimens will be accepted/prioritized for testing and some may end up being rejected.

In general, we are continuing to emphasize the need for testing to rule-out common pathogens and will not be pursuing COVID-19 testing if another likely organism/explanation has been identified. We will need to handle borderline situations on a case-by-case basis for now so please consult as needed on situations of concern that do not meet the criteria below.

Collect specimens for individuals in the following categories for concurrent respiratory panel and COVID-19 testing unless otherwise noted below. (Ideally collect 3 specimens – 2 NP swabs and 1 OP swab; the laboratory may be able to split one NP specimen for both tests though the ordering provider should confirm with the clinical laboratory):

Symptomatic individuals (fever or cough or shortness of breath) AND one of the following (in order of priority)

Tier 1: Health care workers with a known exposure to COVID-19 Healthcare workers who were not wearing appropriate PPE Healthcare workers who were wearing appropriate PPE – start with respiratory panel, if all targets are negative then proceed with COVID-19 testing

Tier 2: Known close contact of a confirmed or presumptive positive COVID-19 case

Tier 3: Patients who are hospitalized and not doing well, regardless of age and comorbidities

Tier 4: Elderly individuals with comorbidities (especially cardio vascular disease, diabetes mellitus,

chronic respiratory disease, hypertension, cancer) >80 years old 70-79 years old 60-69 years old

Tier 5: Tier 4: Elderly individuals without comorbidities >80 years old 70-79 years old 60-69 years old

Tier 6: Individuals residing in congregate living facilities such as jails, Cordilleras, shelters, long-term care facilities - start with respiratory panel, if all targets are negative then proceed with COVID-19 testing

Tier 7: Travelers who returned from areas with sustained community transmission (see CDC list at <u>https://www.cdc.gov/coronavirus/2019-nCoV/hcp/clinical-criteria.html</u>) within 14 days prior to symptom onset

-Please note that providers requesting testing need to be aware that laboratory testing capacity for COVID-19 is limited. While we think that it is reasonable to route specimens for COVID-19 testing to the SMC PHL in the scenarios outlined below, we are still working to clarify which specimens will be accepted/prioritized for testing and some may end up being rejected.

In general, we are continuing to emphasize the need for testing to rule-out common pathogens and will not be pursuing COVID-19 testing if another likely organism/explanation has been identified. We will need to handle borderline situations on a case-by-case basis for now so please consult as needed on situations of concern that do not meet the criteria below.

Collect specimens for individuals in the following categories for concurrent respiratory panel and COVID-19 testing unless otherwise noted below. (Ideally collect 3 specimens – 2 NP swabs and 1 OP swab; the laboratory may be able to split one NP specimen for both tests though the ordering provider should confirm with the clinical laboratory):

Symptomatic individuals (fever or cough or shortness of breath) AND one of the following (in order of priority)

Tier 1: Health care workers with a known exposure to COVID-19 Healthcare workers who were not wearing appropriate PPE Healthcare workers who were wearing appropriate PPE – start with respiratory panel, if all targets are negative then proceed with COVID-19 testing

Tier 2: Known close contact of a confirmed or presumptive positive COVID-19 case

Tier 3: Patients who are hospitalized and not doing well, regardless of age and comorbidities

Tier 4: Elderly individuals with comorbidities (especially cardio vascular disease, diabetes mellitus, chronic respiratory disease, hypertension, cancer) >80 years old 70-79 years old 60-69 years old

Tier 5: Tier 4: Elderly individuals without comorbidities >80 years old 70-79 years old 60-69 years old

Tier 6: Individuals residing in congregate living facilities such as jails, Cordilleras, shelters, long-term care facilities - start with respiratory panel, if all targets are negative then proceed with COVID-19 testing

Tier 7: Travelers who returned from areas with sustained community transmission (see CDC list at <u>https://www.cdc.gov/coronavirus/2019-nCoV/hcp/clinical-criteria.html</u>) within 14 days prior to symptom onset
