The Propositions
2 Would provide \$10 billion to K-12 schools & community colleges to renovate, fix, & construct facilities.
3 Would enshrine the right to same-sex marriage into the California constitution, repealing Prop 8.
4 Would authorize \$10 billion for environmental & climate projects, including drinking water improvements; prioritizing lower-income communities & those most vulnerable to climate change.
5 Would amend the constitution by lowering the required threshold of local electorate to 55% for any borrowing for affordable housing, down payment assistance programs, and other "public infrastructure" projects.
6 Would amend the Constitution to prohibit punishing inmates with involuntary work assignments & from disciplining those who refuse to work.
32 Would raise the minimum wage to \$17 for remainder of 2024, & \$18 an hour starting in 2025.
33 Would allow cities to control rents on any type of housing; including single-family homes & new apartments, & for new tenants.
34 Would require large health care providers meeting specified criteria to spend 98% of revenues from federal discount prescription drug program on direct patient care.
35 Would require the state to spend money from a tax on health care plans on Medi-Cal.
36 Would allow felony charges for possessing certain drugs & for thefts under \$950 with two prior drug or two prior theft convictions & will increase sentences for other drug & theft crimes.
